Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Gillsville Historic District is located along State Route 52 and the railroad in the small town of Gillsville, on the border of western Banks County and eastern Hall County. The district has a linear configuration and is comprised of late 19th-and early 20th century residential and commercial buildings and one antebellum residence.

The commercial town center contains a grouping of several attached onestory brick structures with corbelling, shed porches, and stepped cornices, and a two-story, wood-framed, corner building. There are additional detached onestory commercial structures on State Route 52 near the attached commercial buildings.

Residential structures are primarily one-story, wood-framed, plain style vernacular or Victorian-eclectic structures, sited in the center of their lots and arranged in a row, in fairly uniform setbacks from the railroad. Architectural details include metal roofs, wrap-around porches, multiple gables, chamfered or turned porch posts, balustrades with cutwork, and bracketing on porches. An exception is the antebellum Garrison House, a two-story Greek Revival structure at the east end of the district north of the railroad tracks.

Landscaping throughout the district is informal with grass lawns, randomly planted trees, and shrubbery. Major open spaces are located along the railroad right-of-way and the cemetery at the northwestern end of the district.

The buildings outside the district include non-historic residences, a school, and a church. The National Register boundary is based on the concentrated area of historic structures in Gillsville. Non-contributing properties in the district consist of a small number of modern commercial buildings and non-historic houses.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Gillsville Historic District is significant in the areas of architecture, commerce, community planning and development, and local history.

In terms of <u>architecture</u>, the district is important for its representative collection of 19th-and early 20th-century small-town commercial and residential structures. The commercial area is comprised of one-story attached brick buildings with corbelled cornices, stepped roofline, and front shed porch, and a two-story wood-framed corner building. Residential structures are one-and two-story woodframed vernacular style buildings with front porches, some of which have Victorian detailing. An important antebellum residence is the Garrison Home, a two-story wood-framed structure with Greek Revival detailing.

In the area of <u>commerce</u>, the district is significant for its business center which consisted of a general store, grist mill, cotton gin, blacksmith, carpenters, brick and jug manufacturers. The businesses served the town's residents and those of the surrounding farms.

The district is significant in the area of <u>community planning and development</u> for its development in a linear pattern paralleling the railroad tracks in the 1870s, and for its aasociation with Josiah H. Gill, (1798-1833), an early landowner who served as the town's first postmaster in 1833 and gave the community its name. The linear town plan with its commercial and residential structures sited on both sides of the railroad was one of several characteristic forms taken by small railroad towns in Georgia in the late 19th century.

In terms of <u>local history</u>, the Gillsville Historic District is notable for its association with Josiah Gill, for whom the town was named, and John Garrison (1823-1904) who deeded 825 acres to the Northeastern Railroad Company in 1872 to construct the railroad. Garrison served as the first railroad agent and a member of the original city council. He also operated a hotel in his home for local travelers. The Garrison home is the only pre-Civil War residence in the district. Other early Gillsville residents included Augustus Bryan, farmer; Dr. Welchel, physician; Felix House, owner and operator of a cotton gin; W.A. Gilmer and C.W. Meaders, merchants; W.T. Martin, who built the row of brick stores; and W.A. Miller who built, owned, and operated a general merchandise store.
