Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Odd Fellows Hall (1900) is a well preserved two story frame commercial structure with rectangular plan. The building exhibits a simulated stone tin cladding and retains its original hall interiors on two floors. The hall faces east onto the main business street in Troy Mills.

This two story frame meeting hall measures 26 by 62 feet. The building is front gabled with a full second floor beneath its eavesline. The pedimented stepped gable rises above the false front and forms a pediment. A south side rear entance with stoop enters beneath the corner interior dogleg stair.

Fenestration is generally symmetrical in its distribution, with a storefront level formed of large plate glass, transoms, and a recessed central entryway. Four square cast iron fluted pilasters with squared capitals frame the storefront and entrance. A dentillated band course with end brackets marks the presence of a structural beam between the two floor levels. Eight windows (double hung, 1/1) windows are arranged in two rows of four, on each side wall (on the south wall a rear door is placed in lieu of large window, and a half window lights the stair landing), and are vertically alligned. Rear fenestration consists of single centered windows on each floor. Of special interest are the cast iron window hoodmolds and sills. The hoods consist of side brackets and a molded dripmold.

The cornice treatment is distinctive, consisting of an unenclosed pediment with inscribed dates "1874" and "1900" and the letters "I.O.O.F." Side brackets frame the centeral pediment and define the ends of the cornice line. Intervening brackets break up the cornice line on either side. A lower curved sill line supports the cornice brackets above. The entire cornice is of pressed metal. Originally decorative rounded finials marked each bracket point, one of which survives.

The entire building exterior is clad with sheets (measuring two by four feet) of tin which simulate coursed ashlar stone. The exterior is presently painted a homogeneous white, including the storefront, and cornice areas.

The building has a full basement and a foundation of rubble limestone. Basement windows are found on both sides and a basement door and window are located in the rear.

The interior first floor plan is completely open, with a rear stage and a dogleg stairway in the southeast rear corner. On the second floor the stairway leads into a nearly square cloakroom. An adjoining ante-room shares the same interior end wall and these chambers fill the rear twelve feet of the upstairs. The remainder of the floor is open. Two small rectangular podiums are centered on each end of the rectangular main hall.


The lower floor retains its four feet tall wainscoting, plaster walls, and woodwork. Upstairs wainscoting, woodwork, furnishings, a metal wood stove (the sole source of heat, connecting by piping to a brick interior chimney located in the northwest corner), and original light fixtures remain. An elaborate coved and coiffered embossed metal ceiling is also well preserved.

Alterations have been minimal since construction. The white exterior paint color, apparently applied originally, has recently been restored. The storefront area has been temporarily sealed. West end windows have similarly been temporarily sealed due to threats of vandalism. Inside, linoleum floors replaced carpeting in 1941. Florescent lights now light the second floor area. Aluminum storm windows have replaced original wooden ones.

The Odd Fellows Hall is sited on the west side of Troy Mill's main business street, just north of the Wapsipinicon River, the latter water body bisects the town's small commercial core. At its zenith Troy Mills boasted a string of frame single and two story false front commercial buildings which were centered at the intersection of Linn and then Main Street. The hall anchored the south end of this string which was primarily along the west side of Main Street. The Wapsipinicon River flows southward just behind the hall. The ground level drops towards the river and exposes the basement in the rear of the subject building as it descends.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Odd Fellows Hall (1900) in Troy Mills is a rather late example of "boomtown" construction dressed up in Italianate styling. It shows how the availability of materials like metal cornice, columns, etc. caused particular architectural styles or treatments to continue well past their heyday.

The hall is remarkably well preserved with the exception of the reversible temporary infilling of the storefront windows. The interior, including many orignal furnishings are very well preserved.

Troy Mills was platted in 1870, marking the association of a major flour mill, a river crossing, and a mail-stage route. An 1887 triple span bridge spured town growth. A broad range of services and commercial firms developed a well focused though relatively underdeveloped business core. Community organizations appeared early, among these being the Unadella International Order of Odd Fellows Lodge No. 299, founded in 1874.

The subject property is at least the second building to house the lodge. Constructed in late 1900, lodge records reveal costs and individuals involved. Charles Thompson did the foundation excavation, and mason Tilghman Diltz laid the stone. H. Pugh Hardware was paid \$583. probably to pay for either the tin cornice, the tin ceiling or perhaps both. The total bill cme to \$2,725.11 including \$125. for the lot. The building was dedicated on February 22, 1901.

The lodge and its auxiliary, Rebekah Lodge No. 398 used the upstairs hall. The downstairs appears to have served a broader community function and probably also at least partially supported hall operation and maintanence costs. Uses ranged from annual cemetery association dinners, movies, polling place, to sports activities including a roller rink. The downstairs is now used for storage.
