Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated on Main Street in Bucksport, the Jed Prouty Tavern overlooks the Penobscot River. The nearby structures are a mixture of late nineteenth and early twentieth residential, commercial and public buildings, located on Main Street and on side streets up the hill behind the tavern.

Constructed of wood with clapboard siding, the main section of the tavern stands three-and-one-half stories high. The rectangular structure has a gable roof and extends eight bays on the principal (south) elevation. A one story veranda supported by Doric columns extends the entire length of this facade. The windows are double-hung sash with six-over-six lights.

Designed predominantly in the Greek Revival style, the Jed Prouty Tavern has corner pilasters and a roof entablature with cornice returns. There are two entrances on the south facade, one of which is trabeated with sidelights and a transom. The second entrance, in the older section of the building, is in the Federal style with pilasters flanking a lunette.

The interior contains a variety of nineteenth century woodwork, including a Greek Revival staircase and a Federal style staircase. Original interior moldings exist around the doors and windows and for the wainscot. One ornate mantelpiece in the main lobby dates from the late nineteenth century.

Exterior changes date mostly from the mid-twuntieth century. By the 1960s a one story addition was made to the west side and the rear wing received a second story. Both additions are wood with clapboard siding. More recently, the wooden Tuscan columns were replaced with aluminum Doric ones.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Jed Prouty Tavery is historically significant as the largest surviving early nineteenth century hotel building in eastern Maine and the most prominent landmark on Main Street in Bucksport. Initially constructed at the end of the eighteenth century, subsequent additions substantially enlarged the Inn to its present Greek Revival style appearance. The building has continued in use as a tavern and hotel since 1820.

Nineteenth century documents indicate that the oldest section of the tavern dates from circa 1783 when Asa Peabody erected his house on this site. The building was later occupied by the families of Deacon Darling and Colonel Skinner before being purchased for a tavern by a man named Sparhawk in 1820. He replaced the hipped roof with a gable roof. The existing Federal style doorway and some of the interior moldings in the east half of the building probably date from the conversion to a to a public house.

A variety of landlords succeeded Sparhawk in the early nineteenth century. Bucksport was situated on the stage route between Bangor and important coastal town Castine. In about 1850 Daniel Robinson purchased the building and named it the Robinson House. It was at this time that the major Greek Revival style additions were made. The building was extended to the west and a third story was added. The name "Jed Prouty" was adopted in the early part of the century to capitalize on the success of a popular play which featured this building. The hotel register includes the names of four presidents, Martin Van Buren, William Harrison, John Tyler, and Andrew Jackson, as well as Jefferson Davis and Daniel Webster.
