

The commercial building located at 320 Broadway, Jackson, Ky. evolved from the personage of M. S. Crain. Mr. Crain, affectionately known as "Mitch", first established a business near the river. The store was known as Crain's Wholesale and Retail Store. He served the needs of merchants and individuals who came in boats, wagons and on pack-mules to obtain their various needs.

This business grew as the economy was spurred by the Mowbray Robinson Lumber Mill at Quicksand, Ky. and by an upswing in the coal industry. With this increased activity in business Mr. Crain wisely decided to erect the brick building which is the subject of this discussion.

This is a two-story structure with dimensions of a 50-ft. front by 100-ft length. It contains two floors and a basement which constate of a furnace room only. The building was erected on solid rock even though close to the river. Huge boulders hauled on wagons by teams of oxen filled the base. It took weeks to establish a solid foundation for the building. The outside walls are reported to be 18"-thick brick and mortar. An interior supporting wall is 14"-thick brick and mortar. The third supporting structure of the building rests on solid rock with iron posts of 8" diameter. These posts support the roof.

An unusual feature of this building, as all buildings constructed in this era, was the method of heating. The building had hot-water heat. Since there was no city water system at the time of construction the water to fill the boiler had to have a high elevation for necessary pressure. Each year in the fall the water pressure had to be adjusted by carrying water to a tank located on the second floor.

One interesting feature in the architecture and planning of the building (a tribute to the foresight of Mr. Orain) was in his construction of the sidewalk next to the building on the College Ave. side to exactly coincide to the existing approach of the original bridge which spanned the riv r to South Jackson at that time. The present bridge is the third to span the river.

The contractors or builders of this building were all residents of Jackson. They were the late Harlan Strong, Alf Chalmers and Farish Bach.

After several years of a successful career in the retail business Mr. Crain decided to retire. He sold the building and fixtures to Hugh Needham, R. T. Davis and Walter Hogg. Mr. Crain them moved to Lexington, Ky.

The store building remained unoccupied until V. T. Chapman but me interested in 1/25. At this time the building was leased to Mr. Chapman f r a period of five years. At the end of the first five years! lease the option for another five years was exercised.

After ten years a "gentlemen's agreement" ensued. This agreement prevailed until 1941 at which time V. T. Chapman purchased the building and fixtures from Hugh Needham and Mrs. Wm. Bailey, the widow of Walter Hogg.

The business became known as Chapman's Department Store and remained in the ownership of Mr. Chapman until 1965 at which time Victor Chapman, son of V. T. Chapman, bought the business. He operated the store until 1978. On April 1, 1978 Victor Chapman sold the stock and fixtures to John R. and Elizabeth Herald. This business is presently known as Herald's Department Store, 320 Broadway, Jackson, Ky..


