Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

The Grover School is a one-story building constructed of tightly fitted sawed logs, plastered on the inside and stuccoed on the outside. It is virtually unaltered and therefore retains its historical integrity. The building has a low-pitched hip roof and a rectangular plan consisting of a single classroom. There is a hip roof entrance portico placed symmetrically on the principal facade between bands of windows opening into the classrooms. A simple architrave type of molding is found around the front entrance and the windows, and the paneled front doors appear to be original. The log construction is visible on the portico where the stucco has peeled away slightly.

Statement of Historical Significance:

Construction Date: 1935

Built in 1935, the Grover School is part of the Public Works Buildings Thematic Resource nomination and is significant because it helps document the impact of New Deal programs in Utah, which was one of the states that the Great Depression of the 1930s most severely affected. In 1933 Utah had an unemployment rate of 36 percent, the fourth highest in the country, and for the period 1932-1940 Utah's unemployment rate averaged 25 percent. Because the depression hit Utah so hard, federal programs were extensive in the state. Overall, per capita federal spending in Utah during the 1930s was 9th among the 48 states, and the percentage of workers on federal work projects was far above the national average. Building programs were of great importance. During the 1930s virtually every public building constructed in Utah, including county courthouses, city halls, fire stations, national guard armories, public school buildings, and a variety of others, were built under federal programs by one of several agencies, including the Civil Works Administration (CWA), the Federal Emergency Relief Administration (FERA), the National Youth Administration (NYA), the Works Progress Administration (WPA), or the Public Works Administration (PWA), and almost without exception none of the buildings would have been built when they were without the assistance of the federal government.

The Grover School is one of 232 buildings constructed in Utah during the 1930s and early 1940s under the Works Progress Administration (WPA) and other New Deal programs. Of those 232 buildings, 133 are still standing and are eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. One hundred four school buildings were constructed in Utah, 51 of which remain. In Wayne County, three buildings were constructed, all of which remain standing and are eligible for nomination to the National Register.

The Grover School was built in 1935-36 at a cost of approximately \$1500. Some of the labor and materials were furnished by members of the Grover Ward

activities. 1 Most of the funding and labor, however, were provided by the Works Progress Administration. At the time the building was constructed, the property was fenced and a lawn was planted.²

The Grover School served as a school building for only a short time, since the extremely small size of the community did not, in the school board's opinion, justify the expense of the school's operation. About three years after the building's completion, the children in the upper grades and those of high school age were transported to the schools in Bicknell, some fifteen miles away. The school was closed down completely in 1941.
