The association continued to work diligently to secure the rest of the ridge, but the quarrying continued and at times it looked as if the organization would not be successful. Finally, through legal action, the association was able to prevent quarrying, and in 1933 it bought out the quarry company's lease thus ensuring the preservation and public use of the mountain. The association is still active.

The state and the association worked with the Depression-era federal relief programs to develop the park. In 1933 the 10'-wide road up the mountain was started by the Works Progress Administration (WPA) and was completed in 1937. When the stone cabin at the top of the mountain accidentally burned in 1935, plans were immediately developed for an impressive stone tower/pavilion to be built by the WPA. The handsome Romanesque tower, the most ambitious of the three major mountaintop observation towers in the state system, was completed in 1937 by workmen under the supervision of Harry Webb. In addition to the 30' high observation deck, the structure has rooms, some with fireplaces, and comfort facilities, making it a multi-function building rather than solely a lookout. It stands basically unaltered and is the second largest state park structure built by federal relief labor. It is unlikely that such a monumental structure would have been possible without the federal assistance, and like Rocky Neck, Sleeping Giant State Park is a tribute to the federal, state, and private sector cooperation it took to create a public park in a congested area.
