Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This two story brick block is part of a row of late nineteenth and early twentieth century commercial buildings on Presque Isle's Main Street. The principal facade is divided into three sections with a central staircase entry to the second floor flanked by two stores. The first story consists of brick piers supporting a granite lintel with wood and plate glass display windows. The entrys to the stores and to the upper level are recessed.

The second story has tripartite segmental arched sash over each store with granite muntins and sills. These windows consist of double-hung sash surmounted by a fixed sash with small-paned lights. This elevation is delineated by four brick pilasters linked above the windows by a decorative belt course and at the roof line by a heavy corbelled cornice. In the center is a granite date block with the numbers "1887".

Alterations to the building include remodellings of the storefronts and entrys, the addition of steps necessitated by lowering the grade of the street, and the addition of a pitched roof to solve water leakage problems.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The entire commercial center of Presque Isle was destroyed by a major fire in 1884. Rebuilding included the construction of the National Bank block in 1887. This structure is the most architecturally important commercial block in northern Maine above Houlton.

One-half of the bank block was financed by the stockholders of the bank and the other half by a local businessman, C. F. A. Johnson. The new bank opened on January 2, 1888 with a capital of \$50,000. The bank, a victim of the Depression, closed in March, 1933.

This building's importance as a center of commerce centers on its period of occupancy by the bank between 1887 and 1933. These years were the most important period of development for Aroostook county, which is known as a major agricultural region in the state. Specifically, Aroostook County is important for its potato industry, both as a crop for export and in the manufacture of starch. The Presque Isle National bank was critical in financing development during these prosperous years. Indeed, C.F.A. Johnson, one of the principal share holders, was known as the "starch king". Also significant is the fact that the local newspaper, The Northern Star, occupied half the building for a number of years.

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Although roof and storefront alterations detract from the building's integrity, this structure is the only architecturally distinctive nineteenth century block to survive in the northern half of the county, an area which includes the small cities of Presque Isle, Caribou and Fort Fairfield. Much of the pre-1900 building stock in this region was replaced in the first quarter of the twentieth century or has been demolished. A search of local records, including newspapers, has not turned up information on the architect of the bank building.
