DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on Main Street in the extended business district, this Post Office is surrounded by properties of mixed uses which include the Chamber of Commerce, a small supermarket, filling station and across the street, the Masonic Temple, bank, and Thayers Inn, the town's major hostelry. The neighboring real estate is well maintained, but of such diverse use and building types that a sense of disorder prevails with the Post Office dominating the scene.

An imposing structure three stories in height, it is faced with very attractive variegated brick laid in English bond lavishly trimmed in white marble. is used to form a substantial base, the lower portion of the portico, columns, window trim, quoins, string course, frieze, cornice and an elaborate cupola. Broad granite steps lead to an entrance terrace paved in slate and the hand rails are made of bronze. The single entrance is recessed and arched with a fan light of leaded tracery, this detail repeated each side over casement windows set in wood panels with carved detailing. The lower portion of the portico supports a twostory colonaded section featuring four columns of the Ionic Order; the intervening spaces are filled with large double hung windows panelled below, trimmed in marble and accented with marble keystones. Carved marble feature panels are located between the lower fenestration and the smaller windows of the third floor; this treatment is continued around the main three-story portion of the building. Great care is taken to continue the rich architectural detailing in the two-story wing behind the main portion of the building; all windows on the first floor are arched, with fanlights, panels below and trimmed in the white marble. Further embellishments on the exterior include decorative grillwork at recessed niches in the lower front portico, railing for the second floor windows and around the areaways. addition, the marble frieze has a repeated carved circular motif, the pediment an elliptical window, and the roof a balustrade of fret work each side of the marble cupola.

The interior architectural work is equally executed with great care and taste. The lobby is all in its original state except for the lighting. Flooring of multicolored quarry tile is bordered in grey marble which is also used for stair treads. A black marble base is continued around the lobby and forms the risers of the stair, which has balusters of twisted wrought iron and a polished mahogany hand rail. There is wood wainscot with raised panels and carved top rail, a detail which is repeated in larger scale at the head of the boxes, service windows and vestibule screen. Plain plaster walls have raised plaster medallions on the entrance and inner walls and smaller ones are repeated on the cornice which supports a moulded tray ceiling.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

There can be little doubt that this structure is one of significance to the Town and state as well as to the nation. Its presence in the town of Littleton must be strongly felt by all who pass by and those who use its postal facilities. One cannot help but hope that a future opportunity will occur when the immediate surroundings can be altered to provide the building with a more sympathetic setting. Possibly, the grandest twentieth century Federal building in the state of New Hampshire, this property of exceptional architecture located in a rural area is a constant reminder of Federal power, organization and institutionalization. Constructed in 1933, at a time of expanded Federal building program to alleviate rampant unemployment, this structure is evidence of the ability of the office of the Supervising Architect, James A. Wetmore, to design structures of architectural merit symbolizing government strength and ideals.

This building which has a strong architectural presence on the main thoroughfare of this socio-economic center of northern New Hampshire was constructed in 1933." This was a time of an expanded Federal building program to alleviate rampant unemployment during the great depression. The Federal Employment Stabilization Act of 1931 stressed advanced planning to prevent unemployment and directed construction agencies to prepare six-year building plans. The appropriations for public building were increased by \$100,000,000. that year. Two hundred sixty-seven staff members were added to the Supervising Architect's office increasing the work force to almost eight hundred. Increased volume of building activity did not dramatically change design policy for small post offices, but for projects such as Littleton which combined post office and court house operations as well as offices for additional, governmental agencies, special effort was taken to design a building symbolic of government strength and ideals. The Colonial Revival style selected for this structure was the second most popular architectural mode for Federal Government building design during the 1930's. Along with the Classical style, the Colonial Revival style was "symbolic of both American past and her future progress of increasing the architectural symbol of the Federal Government." This red brick with white marble trimmed building is characterized by Georgian Revival surface treatments (e.g. fanlights, keystone arches and wedge shaped lintel) and features an elaborate cupola with arched openings.

Possibly the grandest twentieth century Federal building in the State of New Hampshire, this property of exceptional architecture located in a rural area is a constant reminder of Federal power, organization and institutionalization.



This building's U. S. Treasury Supervising Architect was James A. Wetmore - born November 10, 1863 in Bath, New York; he was a graduate of Georgetown University. He began work as a law and court stenographer and joined the U. S. Treasury Department in 1885. Over a 45 year period, he held positions within the U. S. Treasury Department ranging from stenographer to Supervising Architect. During his tenure at least 2,000 buildings were designed in his office. He died March 4, 1940.

Carefully maintained over the years and essentially preserved in its original form, this building continues to be an important focal point within the community.
