Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Oliver Building is located at the northeast corner of the Callejon del Correjimiento and Avenida De Diego in the town center of Arecibo. The structure was built for residential and commercial purposes but today houses purely commercial activities. The three-storey structure presents facades on the north, west and south, with a chamfered southwest corner which serves as a main entrance. The north and west facades are divided into seven bays and the south facade into six. Horizontally, the building is composed of two parts: a one-storey base and a two-storey body.

At the base section, a sidewalk gallery is formed by an arcade of circular arches consisting of all bays on the south facade and the sixth and seventh bays of the west facade. All remaining bays are articulated as horseshoe arches and are closed by louvred wooden double-doors and fanlights. A continous molding enframes each arc, crossing the piers at the impost level. A series of lions' heads butt up against a continous stringcourse which separates the body of the building from its base.

The main section of the building comprises the second and third storeys. All bays are articulated as rectangular openings with planar surrounds. Each opening leads to a balustered balcony, supported by decorative brackets. Balconies are treated in size and shape as either individual, with rounded corners; or two-bay, rectangular. The body of the building is characterized by a two-storey monumental composite order, with each pilaster base resting on the string-couse, directly above each lion head. The order supports an entablature which terminates this section.

Capping the composition is a balustered parapet with toman amphorae placed at intervals coinciding with the pilasters of the monumental order. The balauster is interrupted at the chamfered corner by a curvilinear frontispiece which emphasizes the corner entrance and now displays a modern digital clock.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Oliver Building is located where, in 1765, the Spanish Government built the "King's House", a two-storey building used as a military garrison until 1868. Afterward, the structure became a courthouse, police headquarters and a public school. In 1913 the King's House was demolished to make way for Oliver's commercial venture.

The Oliver Building was innovative for its day and age in Arecibo in various ways. It was a venture in that it was the first building in Arecibo to utilize the urban concept of apartment living together with commercial viability; up to then, Arecibo's small town character was emphasized by the presence of single-family dwellings and small shops in and about the center. In this building came to live some of the "best" families of Arecibo. For a time it was also an "international house" of sorts, home to various foreign consulates. Shops occupied all first floor spaces.

Another breakthrough for Oliver, the building was the first to incorporate reinforced concrete construction methods in the Arecibo region. It was also the first structure in Arecibo to address the street and plaza on a diagonal by the use of a chamfered corner entrance. In brief, the building represents the arrival of modernization and then current urban concepts to the northwestern region of Puerto Rico.

Architecturally, the ornamentation reflects the Beaux Arts School of thought spreading throurghout Europe and America, arriving in Puerto Rico with Spanish influence, incorporating elements of traditional Spanish design, such as arcades and massive wall articulation.

Recently, the Oliver Building underwent a restoration/rehabilitation in which the apartment spaces were converted to professional offices. A breakthrouth in itself, the Central Federal Savings Bank was the first agency in Arecibo to commission a sensitive restoration, allowing original partitions and details to remain, arranging commercial functions around existing spaces.

Today the Oliver Building continues to address the plaza with the exhuberance originally intended for such social spaces during their splendor in the 19th century.
