PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION: This large 2½ story frame house, set very close to the Dublin road at a major S-curve at the lower end of Harrisville village, is essentially Greek Revival in style. Although larger than most of its nearby contemporaries, it shares with them such features as overhanging eaves and a pronounced cornice return. Five bays wide, it has a center entry flanked by pilasters and sheltered by a simple, gabled entry porch. Proto-Italianate embellishments unusual in Harrisville include a prominent, sharply peaked gable with single window inset into the roofline over the center bay and clearly distinguishable hoods capping its 2/2 windows. It has twin interior chimneys. (Continued)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: The Maki House derives architectural significance from its locally unusual design and prominent location. However, its primary importance, which is considerable, is historical. Built in late 1879 or early 1880 by the Cheshire Mills Co. to house itinerant construction workers, this house makes an extremely strong addition to Harrisville's nationally unique inventory of mill workers' housing solutions and examples. It has since been nicknamed "The Acre," a generic term borrowed from other industrial communities such as Lowell, MA, which refers to its use and its unprestigious location at the lower end of town.

Strong local tradition has it that its occupants were also employed in the construction and repair of the nearby railroad line whose pivotal local importance lends additional significance to the house.


