ISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The Burr Oak House was built in response the commerce anticipated from the to Plank Road, the village's Watertown first improved transportationway. The land under the hotel was sold to Patrick Kelley by Dewey K. Warren in December, 1852 for \$50.00. Kelley sold the property in 1856 for \$2,500; a price that no doubt reflected the existence of the hotel. It subsequently passed to G.W. Nourse and D.S. Goodwin. Andrew Akin purchased it from Goodwin for \$2,500 in 1885. Various gazetteers identified Nourse and Goodwin as hotel proprietors, identified Akin, however, was as а restaurant owner. He sold the building in 1895. (A,B)

Dr. H.G.B. Nixon established his first Hartland office in the west half of the hotel in 1887, immediately after his graduation from medical school. In addition to providing Hartland with medical service for over fifty years, Nixon was very involved in community and business activities. He succeeded Harry Goodwin as president of the Bank of Hartland, for instance. Perhaps the pinnacle of the health care quality he . gave to Hartland was reached in 1937 when he opened an emergency hospital in the old hotel. It was equipped with a waiting room, offices, an operating room and an x-ray room. Nixon died of a heart attack in 1939. Dr. and Mrs.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Burr Oaks Tavern is locally significant under criterion A for its role in the area of Health/Medicine during the period of 1887 to 1937. In 1887, Dr. H.G.B. Nixon opened a medical office in the Burr Oaks Tavern. As the primary local resource representing the historical evolution of health care in Hartland, the Burr Oaks Tavern played an important historical role in the improvement of local health care which climaxed in the opening of an emergency hospital in the building in 1937. The Burr Oaks Tavern represents the general historical trend towards the professionalization of the health care system.

The tavern is also locally significant under criterion B for its association with Dr. Nixon, a prominent physician in the village. The first local physicians, Drs. Benjamin and McLaren stayed in the community only a short period of time before moving on and had little permanent impact on local health care. Other physicians, Overgaugh and Farley were associated with Nixon as assistant and partner respectively, but Nixon was clearly the most prominent local physician. Nixon practised locally for over 50 years and was largely responsible for the professionalization of the health care services of Hartland. His most important individual contribution to local health care came in 1937 when he established the first community emergency hospital in the Burr Oaks Tavern.

The Burr Oaks Tavern is locally significant in the area of commerce for its role as a commercial hotel in the period c.1853-1885. At the time the hotel opened in c.1853, there were only 3 commercial enterprises in the village. The tavern was built in response to commerce anticipated from the completion of the Watertown Plank Road. The only other hotel of this period, the Otis House was built around the same time to serve the same function, but is no longer extant. The Burr Oaks Tavern is the sole extant resource representing the early commercial development of Hartland.

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)ESCRIPTION

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The Burr Oak Tavern is located at 315-317 East Capitol Drive in the Village of Hartland. Built as an inn for Patrick 1853-1855, the two-story Kelley in gabled frame structure is an example of the early Greek Revival style. The symmetrical main facade features multi-paned sash and frieze windows, and a two-story Doric portico sheltering the main entrance - a heavy architrave uniting two doors. Burr Oak Tavern is T-shaped in plan and has a stone foundation. A onestory non-contributing enclosed porch dating from the early twentieth century appears on each of the east and west facades. On the rear the gabled roof forms a catslide down to a one-story frame hipped roof rear section. The interior has been remodeled extensively to convert the former tavern into a duplex.

ARCHITECTURAL/ENGINEERING SIGNIFICANCE

The Burr Oak Tavern is architecturally significant as an excellent example of the Greek Revival style. The Tavern is one of four surviving Greek Revival structures in Hartland. The other three, the Stephen Warren House (235 East Capitol Drive), 137 North Avenue, and 526 West Capitol Drive, are all vernacular Greek Revival residences, only the first of which is being nominated as it is the only one retaining any degree of integrity. The Burr Oak Tavern is a fine highstyle example of a Greek Revival commercial residence and retains excellent exterior integrity, uncompromised by the small scale twentieth century porches on the sides of the structure.
