The Londershausen Residence is on the corner of Fourth and Main Streets, across from the Courthouse Square Park. It is in a neighborhood of older residences. Locust and apple trees are in the back yard and small shrubs line the foundation of the house.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Londershausen Residence has a rectangular shaped plan, one and one half stories, and three bays wide across the front facade. It is sided with horizontal tongue and grove and has a gable roof with boxed eaves. There are two shed roof dormers on the front and rear facades. The first story windows are four over four double hung sash and fixed with many panes, grouped in bays of three. The second story windows are one over one double hung sash and multiple paned casements in the dormer. The main entry on the front facade has sidelights. The porch across the front facade is supported by four turned columns with capitals The original back porch has been enclosed. The house measures 34' X 36'.

HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

The Londershausen Residence is associated with Paul Londershausen, a Dayton hop grower who lived in the town for fifty nine years. He was born in Germany in 1883 and immigrated to the United Stated with his parents Gottlieb and Sophie Londershausen. The family moved from North Dakota to Dayton, Oregon in 1889. Gottlieb set up shop in Dayton as a shoemaker. Son, Paul, was one of nine children. He and five of his brothers and sisters are listed as living with their father on Fourth Street in 1910 according to Yamhill County Census Records. Paul went into the hop business a few years later and worked as a farmer until his retirement in 1942. He also served as City Councilman and in several other city offices. He and his family moved into their newly built bungalow home in 1921.

SIGNIFICANCE:

This house is architecturally significant as one of the best examples of the Craftsman Bungalow style in Dayton, and the best preserved example locally. Criterion c.
