SUMMARY

The Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory is a symmetrical, two-story, Italianate-style, commerical building constructed in 1873 by George Kitzmeyer as a furniture factory and showroom. The Kitzmeyer building is one of the few surviving Italianate-style buildings in Carson City and is the most ornate example of the once popular commercial style. The building is currently used as real estate offices.

Elaboration

The Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory is constructed in common bond brick, fired at the Gardner Ranch near Carson City. The building is supported by a masonry foundation; added to the structure within two years of its construction. The building terminates in a flat roof marked by a low parapet. This roof was originally clad in tin and is now sheathed in composition roofing.

A single story, open, wooden porch originally spanned the Carson Street (W) and Telegraph Street (N) elevations. This porch was banded by a low, turned balustrade at the second story level. The porch was removed in the early twentieth century. The principal Carson Street first story, commercial front as well as the first bay of the Telegraph Street first story elevation were infilled with flemish bond brick in the early twentieth century. This infill is clearly distinguishable from the original construction. The principal features of the building's original design are, however, sufficiently intact to convey the original design.

The second story of the building survives intact and incorporates two-light-overtwo-light sash windows enframed by simple wood surrounds. These windows are supported by slightly projecting, brick sills and molded wooden lintels. The west and north elevations are banded by an ornate cornice with full entablature incorporating a panelled frieze and paired brackets.

The interior of the building was remodeled in 1901 and 1931 as a result of its change in use from a furniture factory and showroom, to a mortuary and then to a real estate office.

Surviving, original, first story interior features include simple, door and window moldings. The second story retains its original, five-panel, wood doors, window and door surrounds with corner blocks and wide baseboards. Notable interior finishes dating to 1931 includes tongue-and-groove wainscotting, and recessed square ceiling panels with molded joints.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SUMMARY

The Kitzmeyer Furniture Building is locally significant to the architectural and historical development to Carson City, Nevada. The building is the oldest, Italianate-style commerical building to survive in the commerical core of Carson City.

Historical Background

The Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory was constructed in 1873 by George W. Kitzmeyer (1836-1989). Kitzmeyer, a native of Germany, was attracted to Carson City in the late 1860s as a result of the Comstock mining boom. Once in Nevada, he established a harness shop in partnership with his two brothers. George Kitzmeyer also continued to pursue his first vocation as a furniture maker. By 1873 he was sufficiently established to construct a furniture factory and showroom on the corner of Carson and Telegraph Streets in Carson City.

The construction of the building is documented through numerous articles appearing in the <u>Carson City Daily Appeal</u> during the summer and fall of 1873. Originally designed as a three-story structure, the building was completed as a two story building in December, 1873. The building housed a first story furniture and housewares showroom and a second story furniture factory.

Following George W. Kitzmeyer's death in 1898, the furniture business along with the Carson Street building passed to his son, George E. Kitzmeyer, an undertaker. The younger Kitzmeyer continued to operate the family furniture business until 1901 at which time the Carson Street furniture factory/showroom was converted to a mortuary. The Kitzmeyer mortuary business was expanded in 1903 to include establishments in Virginia City and Gardnerville. The Carson City building continued to serve as a mortuary until 1939. A real estate sales office has occupied the first floor of the building since the 1960s. The upper floor of the structure is vacant.

Criteria C

The Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory is the oldest surviving Italianate-style, commerical building in Carson City, Nevada. The building was documented as part of a comprehensive architectural survey funded through the Nevada Division of Historic Preservation and Archeology and the National Park Service in 1980. This survey, undertaken by Historic Environment Consultants of Sacramento, California, identified twelve historically or architecturally significant buildings in downtown Carson City. Of these twelve, the Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory was found to be the most intact example of Italianatestyle architecture associated with the commerical development of late 19th century Carson City.

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The Carson City commerical district is characterized by the small scale, linear development associated with western towns of the period. Surviving historical records and period photographs document that the majority of the town's original commercial buildings were one to two story, brick and frame structures of simple Italianate design similar in overall configuration to the Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory.

The original architectural character of the principal street has been seriously eroded during the twentieth century to include modest scale, mid-twentieth-century, commerical, vernacular buildings constructed in masonry along with garish casinos incorporating plastic and plate glass.

The Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory is one of the few surviving buildings to reflect the original architectural character of the community. Despite modifications to the first story of the building, the Kitzmeyer Furniture Factory retains sufficient integrity to convey those characteristics architecturally significant to Carson City.

KELLY, Plaintiff vs. ELIZABETH MARY PHILLIPS et al, Defendents a certified copy of which was recorded April 19, 1962 in Book 97 of Powers, Plats and Miscellaneous at page 118, thence along the North line of said Parcel No. 2, North 89°53'56" East 85 feet more or less to the West line of that parcel of land first described in that deed to Tom Pardini et ux recorded June 14, 1951 in Book 57 of Deeds, at page 495, Ormsby County, Nevada, records, thence along said West line Northerly to the North line of said Block 31; thence along the North line, Westerly to the point of beginning.
