On the west elevation is a brick chimney in the center, with two sets of multi-paned windows, one on either side, with bracketed window			
boxes under them.			

HISTORICAL INFORMATION: Describe the persons, important events, and/or historical patterns associated with the structure/ site and surrounding area.

According to local tax records, this house was built in 1920'by John T. Ryan. Ryan was a barber in Lodge Grass, and it is guessed that his shop was also located on this land, since in 1922 he was credited with \$2500 worth of improvements on the S 120' of lot 9 (the house) and \$1000 worth of improvements on the S 120' of lot 8 (the barbershop?). There is no building on lot 8 at present (1985). In 1925 an ad in a local paper showed Ryan's Barber Shop in Lodge Grass. Another newspaper article in October, 1925 reported that John Ryan and Jack Mason bought barber shop equipment from Jack Magoon, who was moving from Lodge Grass to Wyoming. Ryan was a respected member of early Lodge Grass, and after the town was incorporated in September, 1927, he was elected its first mayor, defeating Paul Johnson, owner of the local lumberyard, for that position." The Ryan family owned<sub>5</sub> this property until 1962, when it was acquired by Charles Westwood. A 1957 newspaper article, however, indicated that John Ryan, by that time, had relocated to Colorado.

The house has good integrity. It is in its original location, and has maintained much of its original design. It is in good physical condition and can convey historical associations.

HISTORICAL and/or ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE: Justify how the persons, important events, or historical patterns associated with structure/site lend the property significance and/or describe the ways in which the structure embodies the distinctive characteristics of a particular period, building type, or style.

This property is historically significant because it is associated with the life of someone who played a prominent role in the history of Lodge Grass. John Ryan was a well know local businessman in early Lodge Grass. He came to the community around 1920 and operated a barber shop here for many years. In 1927 he was elected the first mayor of the newly incorporated city of Lodge Grass. This house is a good example of a typical 1920s era residence in the town. It is located, actually, in the heart of the business district, which is different from most of the houses in Lodge Grass.
