The Hiram C. Smith House is an early example of a vernacular farm residence built of limestone. It is the only extant single cell residences with entrance to the side of the gable front.

The 12' x 20' one story gabled house is constructed of rubble limestone which was probably quarried along Middle River on Smith's property in the northwest quarter of Section 7, Lincoln Township. The north main facade with normal road setback has the entrance to the west side of the gable front. The west facade has a door under the eaves with a window on the left. The south facade has a window on the left of the gable, and the east has two under eave windows.

All facades are constructed of rubble, roughly coursed with random bond and grapevine joints. Quoins are of rubble, squared at the edges that form the edge of the house. Jambs are of rubble, squared with mortar. A single wood beam across the top of each side wall serves as the lintels and supports the rafters. Sills are of wood and windows are not splayed. Doors are neither recessed nor paneled. Eaves and verges overhang very little and are closed. The roof is of wood shingles. The interior walls have rough nortar over the stone.

The house is one of the simplest and most roughly constructed residences in the county. It does not evidence the stone masonary skills used in the other stone residences in the county. Instead, it seems likely that the house was built by its farmer/owner. The lintel construction system is found only in this house and the Smith Milking Shed (75N29W-1.2), suggesting that it was a construction innovation, requiring few skills, which might have been used by the farmer/builder.

Hiram C. Smith, one of the earliest settlers in the township, obtained patent deed to the 280 acre farm between 1854-56. The relatively large productive farm with the very inexpensive small house suggests that it may have been built very early, perhaps before Smith's marriage. The land where the stone probably was quarried was purchased in 1856 with Smith obtaining patent deed in 1858. Probably this property was purchased specifically for the stone used to build this house, a milking shed and the bottom story of his large barn.
