Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Josephine Martin Glidden Memorial Chapel is a small, but imposing, rectangular masonry structure sited at the entrance to Mt. Pleasant Cemetery. With Romanesque rustication and gothic detailing, the building was constructed of native Sioux Quartzite blocks, which are set off with light colored terra cotta arches, courses, and parapets. The reddish-brown granite blocks were tuck pointed with a matching mortar. Originally, the gable roof was sheathed with ceramic tiles, but due to their deteriorating condition, the tiles were recently removed exposing equally deteriorating wooden roofing boards. Plans are being formulated to replace the roof with either tiles or some acceptable substitute.

On the east is the entry facade, consisting of a projecting narthex with a large gothic arched doorway and a slight, triangular parapet. On the east gable wall, above the narthex, are three small gothic arched windows. Each gable wall is capped by a triangular, stepped parapet. Axial wall fenestration consists of three larger gothic arched windows. Now covered with boards, the windows were initially of an amber glass with stained glass medallions set into the center of the upper panes. An end wall chimney rises along the west gable wall. The entire building is wrapped by a water table, the upper course of which is constructed of terra cotta.

Glidden Chapel rests on a stone foundation and basement, which served as a receiving crypt for corpses during winter months when the ground was difficult to excavate. Entrance to the basement crypt is gained either by an outside stairway on the southwest corner of the building or by an opening in the chapel floor. Although they have long since disappeared, the chapel was initially furnished with wooden pews. The interior remains essentially undecorated.

Original architectural plans included restrooms and office space, neither of which were ever completed. The current proposal calls for renovating the buildings as well as finishing the initial design. The cemetery association wishes to restore the chapel to its intended usefulness for the community.

Builder/Architect Hugill and Blatherwick, Architectural firm Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Significant in the area of architecture, the Josephine Martin Glidden Memorial Chapel is a good example of funerary architecture in a gothic style with Romanesque features. The building served the community for several decades as a service chapel, a shelter from inclement weather for cemetery visitors, and as a receiving crypt. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the property relates to the historic context labeled: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, I. Burial Practices.

Constructed of Romanesque rusticated Sioux Quartzite block, a stone native to the area, the chapel exhibits gothic characteristics such as arched fenestration openings and a steep gable roof. Located at the cemetery entrance, slightly west of the main driveway, the chapel is in harmony with granite gateposts of the same The building looks like religious structures of the period, but was marked for no particular denomination. Rather, it functioned as a community hall in a community cemetery. Except for permanent mausoleums, there are no other similar funerary structures in the city.

Mt. Pleasant Cemetery is the oldest surviving cemetery in the city of Sioux Falls. It was founded in 1873 and platted the following year. In the 1880's, two earlier cemeteries were closed and the graves moved to Mt. Pleasant. Many of the notable early citizens of the community are interred there. By 1900, it was a well-developed burial ground. Since then, however, it has been overshadowed by larger, newer cemeteries, and until renewed interest in the late 1970's, had fallen into some disrepair. Likewise, so had the Glidden Chapel, the most prominent feature of the cemetery.

As early as 1899, the cemetery board of trustees had been hoping to build a chapel and shelter house at Mt. Pleasant, but funds never seemed to be readily available for this project. Upon her death in 1921, Josephine Martin Glidden bequeathed the cemetery with a gift of \$13,000.00 for construction of such a building. Her late husband, Dan L. Glidden, served as a cemetery trustee from 1904 until his death in 1912. Mrs. Glidden took a great interest in the well-being of the cemetery during and after her husband's tenure on the board. The chapel is a tribute to that devotion.

The local architectural firm of Wilford F. Blatherwick and George C. Hugill contracted to design the building. Both men had established a reputation throughout the state and especially in the local community as quality institutional architects. There are two other buildings constructed by this firm in South Dakota that are listed on the Register. They are the Soldiers and Sailors World War Memorial, in Pierre, Hughes County, and the Grand Lodge and Library of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, in Sioux Falls, Minnehaha County.

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Opened to the public in 1925, the chapel's first funeral was that of the cemetery's longtime supporter and trustee Dennis L. McKinney. Plans for restrooms and an office were never brought to fruition. Until the 1950's, the building continued to be used as a chapel, but the temporary crypt never saw frequent use. By the 1960's, the chapel was used only for equipment storage.

Although now in deteriorating condition, the building has never suffered alteration. Currently, there is fervent interest to restore it and return it to its original function as a service chapel and a temporary burial crypt. Volunteer groups have policed the exterior and interior, and professionals have tuck pointed three walls. Much additional work is planned including a new roof, tuck pointing for the fourth wall, replacement of deteriorated terra cotta sections on the south facade, restored interior walls, and completion of the restrooms and office space. Listing is an important step in continuing the preservation effort at the chapel.
