Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Located approximately two and one-half miles east of Cumberland City (pop. 276), the Henry Hollister House is a circa 1850s residence designed in a transitional Greek Revival/Italianate style. The principal entry to the residence was originally on the southeast where it faced a major road leading into Nashville. After the new road was built, the northwest facade became the principal entry.

This two story brick residence is constructed of Flemish bond, except for the base courses which are composed of common bond; some penciling is still evident. A plain frieze and brackets embellish the area below the eaves. Both the northwest and southeast facades have two story pedimented porticoes with square molded wood columns. Entries are double-leaf glass and panel doors surmounted by transoms. Louvered shutters flank the 2/2 double-hung windows. The windows have molded sills, lintels, and panels. The second story windows behind the porticoes were originally doors.

Two outside end chimneys are located on the southwest and northeast elevations. A one story addition was constructed on the southwest elevation in the late nineteenth century. Built in a common bond brick pattern, it contains a single leaf door and a pedimented portico. A modern (1960s) one story brick addition with a porch is also located on this elevation.

The interior of the central passage house is embellished with molded wood door and window casings, molded wood baseboards, and paneled doors. Brackets, a turned wood balustrade, and a polygonal newel post delineate the central stair. Interior doors on the first floor are capped with transoms. Only one original fireplace is extant. Located on the first floor, it has a plain mantle and colonettes. Paneled closets are seen on both floors of the house.

A cast iron cemetery fence surrounds the graves of Henry Hollister, his wife Emma Gault Hollister, and Jesse Brunson (b.April 22, 1793, d.December 30, 1836). The fence has three rails and pickets of various heights. The gate and corners have more elaborate posts.

Two frame barns and a pole garage are located within the boundaries of the nominated property. They do not contribute to its significance.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Henry Hollister House is significant under National Register criterion B because of its association with Hollister, a prominent ironmaster in Stewart and Houston Counties during the height of the iron industry on the Western Highland Rim. Architecturally, the house is a good example of transitional Greek Revival/Italianate design. Distinguishing features include an unusual combination of common and Flemish bond brick, a bracketed frieze, and paneled wood trim.

Jesse Brunson at one time owned the land that this house (and the Brunsoni Furnace 40SW219) sits on. Brunson's heirs sold the land to James L. James in 1841 and in 1850 James sold it to Henry Hollister. Hollister, an ironmaster from Ohio, then dismantled the furnace and rebuilt it at a new site as Ashland Furnace(40H019). Ashland Iron Works was comprised of Byron Forge(40H021) and Ashland Furnace. In 1852 Hollister, LaBoiteux and Company owned Ashland and in 1953 Hollister was a partner with Thomas Phillips and Richland Jordan in Ashland Iron Works. Hollister also owned Poplar Spring Furnace(40MT376) in adjacent Montgomery County in 1850.

During the 1850s the iron industry in Stewart County and in most of the Western Highland Rim was at its peak. Fourteen furnaces and one rolling mill were operating in Stewart county and three furnaces and one forge were operating in Houston County. Henry Hollister was actively involved in several of these iron works and by 1860, he was reported to be worth \$30,000.00, a considerable amount for this region. By 1865 the Ashland Iron Works had ceased operation and that year Hollister leased the land for mineral rights.

Hollister purchased the former Brunson farm and is believed to have built the present brick house in around 1850. The combination of Flemish bond brick for most of the facades and common bond for the base courses is unusual. Although the Greek Revival/Italianate style is seen frequently in Middle Tennessee, it is rare in Stewart County. 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is representative of the type of residence an ironmaster might have built near one of his furnaces. The Samuel Stacker House is another example. Stewart County presently has no houses listed in the National Register. United States Department of the Interior National Park Service

Verbal Boundary Description

Beginning at the intersection of the road and the fence(A), the boundary moves northerly along the fence approximately 250 feet; the boundary then moves northwesterly approximately 550 feet; the boundary then moves southerly approximately 200 feet until it intersects with the road; the boundary then follows the road approximately 700 feet to the point of the beginning.
