Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Occupying a wooded site on a farm road in Popple Township, Gran Lutheran Church is a rectangular, log-framed, gable-roofed structure with a rubble fieldstone foundation, an exterior rubble fieldstone chimney on the east elevation, and a wood-shingle roof. The principal (north) facade displays a double, wood door with a boarded transom. There are boarded window openings on the other elevations. Hand-sawn and squared, the logs are chinked with cement and joined at the corners in a dovetail notch. The structure measures about 20 feet in width (east to west) and about 25 feet in length (north to south).

There have been two minor alterations: in 1937, the stone chimney was rebuilt (it bears an inscription with this date), and in the 1970s, the original, wood door was replaced with the present entrance.

This property consists of one contributing building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

During the early twentieth century, American church reformers frequently criticized the establishment of small rural churches on the grounds that such institutions resulted primarily from interdenominational rivalry, which "overchurched" an area with poorly maintained buildings and ill-trained, part-time ministers.¹ Such criticism has little relevance for Gran Lutheran Church. When the building was constructed in 1897, it was quite literally the only church in a newly settled region. Its founding pastor, Rev. G. P. Nesseth, was a college-educated, seminary-trained minister who remained with his congregation until his death in 1937. Currently maintained as a community historic site, Gran Lutheran Church is historically significant for its vital role in the settlement of Clearwater County and in the religious life of the area's Norwegian-immigrant community.

After the Civil War, lumber companies moved into the north-central region of Minnesota to harvest the area's rich pine lands. By the early 1890s, timber crews had reached the Clearwater County area, which then comprised the western part of Beltrami County. Homesteaders entered the region simultaneously with loggers, either clearing and selling their own timber so they could begin farming, or purchsing "cutover" land from lumber companies. During most of the 1890s, lumbering and agricultural settlement proceeded slowly, hampered by the lack of rail transportation. In 1898, however, the Great Northern Railway built a main line across the northern part of the region, and the resulting increase in settlement and logging led to the formation of Clearwater County as a separate entity in 1902.²


The earliest center of homesteading and lumbering was Popple Township, situated in the northwestern corner of the county. The first permanent settlers were largely Norwegian immigrants, who, in 1895-1896, banded together to form the region's first church congregation, which they named Gran Lutheran Evangelical Church. Their pastor was Rev. G. P. Nesseth, an ordained Lutheran minister of Norwegian stock who had come to the newly opened pine region to undertake missionary work. Rev. Nesseth and his flock were members of the Norwegian Lutheran EvangelicalChurch of America (commonly known as the "Norwegian Synod"), which emphasized the retention of traditional Norwegian culture, language, and liturgy. Like many of the Synod's ministers, Rev. Nesseth had been educated at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, and had then attended the Synod's seminary in the Twin Cities. During his first two years in the Clearwater County area, Rev. Nesseth held services in the homes of congregation members. In April 1897, however, the Gran congregation decided to build the region's first church. The membership donated logs, land, labor, and about \$20 in cash for the building, which was completed in July of the same year. Ole Eneberg, a church member, supervised construction. Gradually expanding its membership to Lutherans of other ethnic backgrounds, the Gran congregation continued to use their log-framed church until 1953, when the membership merged with another local congregation to form Our Savior's Lutheran Church in the nearby community of Ebro. Although the building has been vacant for three dacades, it is maintained as a community historic site. In 1973, the Clearwater County Historical Society placed a plaque on the building commemorating its historical importance as "the first church built in Clearwater County." ³

Beginning at the northeast corner of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of Section number twenty-two, township one hundred forty-seven north of range thirty-eight west, running thence west on Section line fifteen rods, thence south parallel to forty line east thereof, sixteen rods, thence east parallel to section line north thereof, to forty line, thence north on forty line to point of beginning. The boundary includes the entire one and one half acre parcel that has historically been associated with the property.
