Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Surprise Opera House is located at the southeast corner of the intersection of Miller and River Streets, on land donated by George Miller for a community hall and opera house. Constructed in 1913 by the town of Surprise, the concrete block, Vault-Facade structure measures approximately 40 feet wide by 70 feet long. It has a double-pitched, asphalt-shingled roof. Pillars decorate the front of the building. Access to the auditorium is through double doors in the center of the building. A ticket window accesses both the exterior of the building and the small 12-square-foot foyer under the balcony.

The auditorium is thirty-eight and a half feet wide with a number of windows on both sides. The room measures thirty-eight and a half feet long from the entrance to the proscenium opening at the stage. Three pillars support a curved balcony, which has a depth of ten feet at the center and thirteen feet on the sides. The front of the balcony is protected by a narrow knee-high wooden rail. Stairs to the balcony are on the house right side of the auditorium. The auditorium has a sculptured tin ceiling in excellent condition. The wooden floor is also in good condition.

The proscenium arch measures 19 feet wide by approximately 10 feet high; there are only about five feet of wing space on each side of the stage. No access to the stage exists on the sides. A space under the stage may have served as dressing rooms. The space is approximately the same size as the stage area. It is reached via a railed stairway on the stage right side. The stage measures approximately twenty feet from the proscenium opening to the back wall of the auditorium. An 18-inch apron contains a footlight trough. On trap door exists up stage right.


The structural and historical integrity of the building and theatre has been preserved.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Surprise Opera House is significant for its association with and in reference to the historic context "Aesthetic Systems: Itinerant and Local Performing Arts in Nebraska" and the property type of "Opera House Buildings in Nebraska, 1867 to 1917." Under Criterion A, this opera house is significant in the areas of the performing arts; entertainment/recreation; and social history, on a state level, as a well preserved example of an opera house building in Nebraska. The building retains a high degree of historical integrity, possessing the physical and associative characteristics to make it an eligible member of its property type.

This opera house is significant in the area of performing arts for bringing a variety of entertainment to the community of Surprise. As a facility for the performing arts, it offered productions such as vocal ensembles; impersonators; gospel singers; and home talent plays. (See following table of Representative Entertainments 1913-1917.)

This opera house is significant in the area of entertainment/recreation, since it provided a place where the whole community could gather to attend inspirational lectures, cartoonists, humorists, and moving pictures. (See following table of Representative Entertainments 1913-1917.)

This opera house is significant in the area of social history because it gave Surprise a neutral, nonaffiliated location for women's society dinners and benefits for such organizations as the Red Cross. (See following table of Representative Entertainments, 1913-1917.) In the days before radio, television, and movies, activities at the opera house were anticipated for days or weeks ahead of time. It provided a place for people to get together to have a good time and forget their troubles over crops, weather, taxes, the railroads, and the generally hard life of settling the Great Plains.

The period of significance derives from the original construction date of the building, 1913, when the town board voted to erect a new town hall, the building they called the Surprise Opera House. The period of significance continues through 1917, the year considered to signal the end of the opera

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house era in Nebraska, based on declining numbers of touring companies nationally and rising numbers of movie houses and automobiles. The proximity of the larger towns of Osceola (19 miles), David City (19 miles), and Seward (23 miles), all of which had both large auditoriums able to offer major entertainments and moving picture theatres by 1917, meant that as more Surprise residents bought cars, activities in those nearby cities became a viable option. Limited choices in the Surprise Opera House doomed it to a dwindling number of sporadic events, primarily significant under the category of social history.
