

Boundary Description

Lot #602 on 1937 Platt of City of Louisa, Kentucky. This parcel encompasses all of the land associated with the nominated building.

45. Description and House Plan:

This Neoclassical Revival style building veneered in brick and ornamented in sandstone is highlighted with a shallow yet monumental portico. The columns are Tuscan, supporting a plain stone entablature capped by a pediment ornamented with prominent dentils. A projecting molded dentil cornice extends from the base of the pediment around the three principal elevations. Approximately one foot below, the molded architrave of the portico also continues around the facades in concert with the cornice to strongly define the contour and attic of the building. A stepped and gabled brick parapet with stone coping hides the hipped roof. A stone water table completes this classical composition. A strong podium, in this case, the raised basement, is a typical classical characteristic. For the three principal facades, an extruded, ridged brick of very dark red was laid in a running bond with a raked joint; the rear elevation is a lighter, variegated molded brick.

Stained glass windows, richly colored, ornament inside and out. On the long elevations they are arranged as a trio of large, arched windows articulated by paired pilasters in the slightly projecting center bay flanked by rectangular windows in the end bays. The front window arrangement is secondary to the portico. A pair of tall, segmental-arched blind windows are centered on the rear elevation; in between there is a small rose window which appears to be a later addition.

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14. History: Continued

On the interior a small, utilitarian foyer marks the entrance and contains stairs leading to the sanctuary, basement and balcony. The balcony can be used for classrooms or extra seating in the sanctuary. The basement has a large room in the center with small classrooms flanking it. The sanctuary is a large, open space with coffered ceiling. New pews in a center aisle pattern replace pews arranged with two aisles in a semi-circle.
