DESCRIPTION (Continued)	Constructed on a rectangular plan with its ridge parallel to the street, this structure has a steeply pitched roof with no overhangs. It has a small brick chimney which does not appear to be original. It has four windows flanking the center entry at the facade; two are six-oversix; two are two-over-two. Its gables have five larger windows with two small windows at the second floor under the eaves. Its entry door has four recessed panels and is flanked by wide head and jamb moldings stopped by a projecting cornice.

SIGNIFICANCE	This house was recorded on the W.P.A. survey and dated early nineteenth century. However, land record research suggests a late eighteenth-century date, possibly the 1790's. The original owner of this house has not been documented. It was owned by the Tucker family in the last half of the nineteenth century, and probably Reuben Frisbie before that, but the boundaries are not clear. It is referred to as the "24 acre homestead."  Very few of these simple one-and one-half story farmhouses have survived, making this house a significant part of Branford's collection of eighteenth-century colonial houses. (See 11 Juniper Point for a house with an identical arrangement of seven windows in the gable end.)
