DESCRIPTION (Continued)	In the 5-bay front elevation, the windows are 2/2. At the first floor they are unusually tall, and their lintels are continued as a string course, in wood. The eaves overhang the front wall by perhaps 10". The gable ends at attic level are covered with imbricated shingles. The rear roof slope extends in a saltbox profile. An ell has been added. First-floor summer beams run front-to-rear. The second floor girts are cantilevered out beyond the plate, to give greater span to the lean-to rafters. An 1889 picture shows no porch at all. A 1928 picture shows a full width front porch in the Italianate style.

	19. HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE
SIGNIFICANCE	The house is architecturally significant because it is a good example of Colonial domestic architecture with tall first floor windows reflecting later Greek Revival/Italianate influence, and with imbricated shingle gable ends, a feature of the Queen Anne style. The house is significant historically because it was the home of Dr. Henry Skelton, Southington's second physician, who was born in England in 1688. Skelton gives a complete chain of title, with land records references.
