Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Liberty Lodge (c.1880) is a two story frame late Greek Revival Masonic hall prominently located in the small crossroads community of Keachi. Despite some alterations, the building retains its National Register eligibility.

The lodge has a curious history. What we know of it comes from Lodge Brother William H. Abington, who about 30 years ago examined lodge records which are now lost. His recollection, together with the architectural evidence, presents the following picture. Apparently Liberty Lodge was built c.1852 and severely damaged or outright destroyed by a tornado in 1880. It was rebuilt shortly thereafter using much of the original material. Although the rebuilding program maintained the essential Greek Revival style of the building (the Greek Revival taste being still current in Keachi), it is not known what specific design changes were made.

The present building consists of a shop below and a lodge meeting hall/ceremonial chamber above. The rear of the building contains ancillary rooms and an enclosed staircase which ascends to an anteroom to the meeting hall.

The lodge's principal architectural feature is its facade. This consists of a three bay entrance loggia with a fairly full entablature which is surmounted by a clapboarded second story with two windows. This in turn is surmounted by a full pediment with a similar entablature to the loggia. Under the loggia is a flushboard front with a central entrance door flanked by windows. Mid-nineteenth century salvaged elements include the columns, entablature and flushboarding of the loggia, the detailing of the pediment, and apparently the surviving six over six windows. It is difficult to tell if other elements of the present building are salvaged or if they were installed new in 1880. The interior is a hodgepodge of different types of tongue and groove beaded board. The meeting hall itself is completely modern with plywood paneling and an acoustical tile ceiling. Other changes include the replacement of the side windows with aluminum nine over six units, the addition of a side lean-to, and the installation of a metal fire escape.

Assessment of Integrity:

Despite these changes, the lodge still easily conveys its Greek Revival style, with elements including the loggia, the pediment, and two entablatures.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Liberty Lodge #123, F & A M is locally significant in the area of architecture because it contributes to the distinctly Greek Revival architectural heritage of DeSoto Parish.

Although it is a late example, the lodge shows the continuing Greek Revival taste in the later nineteenth century in DeSoto Parish. This area was settled in the antebellum period by individuals from South Carolina, Alabama, Georgia, and other nearby states. They embraced the popular Greek Revival style and created an impressive architectural heritage which spans the Civil War. Although many examples have been lost, an astounding number survive. Excluding New Orleans, DeSoto is one of three parishes considered to be major centers of Greek Revival architecture in the state. Whereas other parishes average about a half dozen Greek Revival residences, DeSoto boasts at least twenty. Moreover, DeSoto is very unusual in having four Greek Revival churches, a temple fronted store, and Liberty Lodge. These non-residential examples show how the Grecian style was adapted for all types of structures from shops to institutional buildings. They also set the DeSoto collection of Greek Revival buildings far above those found in other parishes where virtually all the examples are residences. Thus the lodge helps DeSoto Parish present a more complete picture of the overall Greek Revival than can be seen elsewhere in the state.
