### Amended Items in Nomination:


Gilbert's Cabin offers evidence of dovetail-notched log cabin design qualities. However, the cabin has lost integrity as a building and therefore is best evaluated as a site. Because sites do not convey architectural significance, this site is being listed based on its historical associations only (ie. only under criterion A). Although the criterion D significance of Gilbert's Cabin has not been evaluated, it is possible that the cabin has the potential to yield information about dovetail-notching as a log cabin construction technique. This information was confirmed over the telephone by Gretchen Luxenberg, historian in the NPS Pacific Northwest Regional Office.

Log cabin. Log construction set on log beams; rectangle (18' x 25'); 2 bays wide; 1-story; hand-hewn planked logs (average: 17" wide) with full dovetail notches at corners; entrance opening (34" wide) with plain surrounds on east facade; window openings (2.5' wide) on north, east and west facades with plain surrounds (5" wide).							
This hewn log cabin was built in the 1890s by a French Canadian named Gilbert Landre. He first arrived in the area in 1888 and built a small log cabin at this site. By 1893 he was hewing logs for a new cabin and had walls halfway up when an avalanche destroyed his work. By 1894 the present cedar log cabin was completed. Originally a 1 1/2-story, gable roof cabin set on a round log foundation with 4/4 double-hung sash, a board and batten door and a front deck running the width of the structure. All that remains today are four walls (12' high) with door and window openings. Landre was a trapper and miner who discovered the Boston ledge (with G. L. Rowse and J. C. Rouse in 1889), and claimed the Chicago, Buffalo and Denver ledges, all located in the Cascade Mining District. All of Landre's interests, comprised of 15 claims, were acquired by the London and Galena Mining and Milling Company which planned to develop them. His cabin became a hostelry for other miners working the area, or people passing through. The cabin was one large room with a loft that was reached by stairs in the NW corner. There were bunkbeds inside. After Landre's death in Marblemount in 1905, his cabin continued to serve as a


