Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The firehouse at 34 Huyshope Avenue, formerly the home of Engine Company 6, is located southeast of Hartford's downtown in an industrial area near the Colt Firearms factory. Built in 1938, the two-story brick building was designed in a Moderne style with square massing, a flat roof, and brownstone trim. It is now used as a homeless shelter operated by the City of Hartford.

The foundation of the building is brownstone along the facade, and concrete in the rear. The brown brick walls are interrupted by brick piers with brownstone caps located at the corners of the building and between the three bays of the facade (Photograph 1,2). Bands of brownstone also serve as lintels above the windows and two entrance bays of the facade, and as trim around the watchroom door on the north side. Here, the stone is incised with Art Deco-style detailing (Photograph 3). Above the central window on the facade is a stone plaque marked "Steam Fire Engine No. 6," which originally appeared on the Engine Company's first building at 98 Huyshope Avenue (Photograph 1).

The firehouse retains its original windows - tall bands of metal casements - in groups of two and three along the facade and south side. A three-story square hose tower stands to the rear of the building.

The firehouse is entered via a watchroom on the left side which is separated from the apparatus room by a wood-paneled wall. The apparatus room is a plain rectangular space with brown and tan glazed-brick walls and a concrete floor. On the second floor are three offices with the dormitory and bathrooms behind. The dormitory is lit by a skylight and period light fixtures.

The structural frame of the building is reinforced concrete.

Alterations to the building have been few. The sliding poles were removed when the building was converted to a shelter, a drop ceiling was installed in the second-floor offices, and the entrance bays now have overhead metal doors.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The 34 Huyshope Avenue firehouse displays a high level of integrity in design, materials, setting, and association. A basis on which to evaluate its significance is contained within the associated historic context, "Fire Service in Hartford, 1789-1939."

34 Huyshope Avenue was the second firehouse built for Engine Company 6, organized in 1873. The company's first house, a large brick Italianate building, was damaged by the flood of 1936 and demolished the same year. Company 6, called the "Colt Engine Company" in the 19th century, was one of the first fire companies in the city. The building ceased operation as a firehouse in 1982 when the company was disbanded.

The firehouse was designed by the Hartford Architectural Bureau, supervised by architect Frank W. Whiton. As an agency of the City of Hartford, the Bureau was responsible for the design of two firehouses, this one and the station of Engine Company 5 at 129 Sigourney Street. Both are very similar in style and design, although the design of this station is simpler. It serves as an excellent example of the work of the Bureau and the conservative application of the Moderne style to firehouse design in a time of limited financial resources.

This firehouse meets the requirements for registration as outlined in the multiple property submission, "Firehouses of Harford." It retains its original massing, layout and decorative elements and contains those features characteristic of firehouse design: apparatus room, watchroom, large entrance bays, sleeping quarters, hose tower. The sliding poles were removed when the building was converted to a shelter.
