Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Henry Schwedes House is a two-story Italianate solid brick dwelling located on a corner site. It is built on a cement-plastered native limestone foundation, with a symmetrical cube facing Main Street flanked to the rear by a one-and-a-half-action and one-story brick wing. Each section is capped with a matching hipped roof. The main wing, which is as large as the other two combined, is entered via a side hall.

A gabled entry canopy and enclosed kitchen porch on the rear replaced earlier fulllength verandas at an unknown date. A wooden faceted dining room bay on the southeast side reflects a ca.1910 remodeling, as does the rear, one-story wing. Both are carefully matched to original construction, the latter going so far as to reproduce the wood false window hoods of the main wing.

The main wing to the front is set off by carved cornice brackets. Designed as double volutes, they are attached to wide, plain friezeboards, and are finished with acorn pendants. In a departure from usual Italianate practice, most of the brackets are centered over the windows rather than marking the wall piers.

Except for the enclosure of the porch and abbreviation of the front entry, the house looks very much the same today as it did shortly after construction of the ca.1910 bay window. The two main wings are unchanged in plan, fenestration, or cornice work from their 1882 design. The property also contains a modern garage separated to the rear of the historic building; it is noncontributing.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Henry Schwedes House exemplifies the Italianate style in its peak year in Wabasha. As the first Wabasha home of a young businessman whose parents had emigrated from Germany, it also initiated a second generation of brick residential construction for prominent local merchants.

The Schwedes House is an excellent example of the Italianate style as seen in its two-story height, and nearly square shape with smaller wings extending to the rear of the building. Additional hallmarks include the gently-sloping hipped roof and distinctive wide eaves with double brackets, as well as tall, double hung windows decorated with hood molds. Even the ca.1910 bay window, with its double hung sash and brackets, accentuates the Italianate design scheme.

Henry Schwedes played an important role in Wabasha's history during the period identified by the Agricultural Development and Railroad Construction historic context. Schwedes was born and trained as a bookkeeper in Wisconsin. In 1882, he married Lucas Kuehn's daughter, took charge of the Kuehn Mercantile Company's books, and moved into the new brick house across Main Street from Kuehn's residence. In a short time, he became secretary-treasurer of Kuehn's booming enterprise and rose to the position of general manager.

The Schwedes House has undergone few minor alterations since it was constructed in 1882, and thus retains excellent historic architectural integrity.
