Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Anthony United States Post Office (c. 1937-1938) is located at 121 West Steadman in Anthony, Harper County, Kansas (pop. 2,661). The one-story, flat roofed, red brick building has a southern facade orientation. The building measures approximately sixty feet from east to west and fifty-four feet from north to south, with a twenty-one foot rear projection. The building's center, double door entrance is delineated by a classical surround with fluted pilasters and a dentilled entablature. Steps lead up to the doorway. Two pairs of large windows surmounted by flat limestone lintels and underscored by recessed brick panels flank the doorway. Five windows with similar treatment pierce the east and west elevations of the building. This post office is an example of a smaller class C or D standardized design type that was repeated throughout the country during the 1930s.

The mural "Turning a Corner" was installed on the west wall of the Anthony Post Office lobby above the postmaster's door and the two bulletin boards which flank it. This is the traditional location for Section artwork in the smaller class C and D post offices. "Turning a Corner" is an oil on canvas mural that depicts three farmers on a combine threshing wheat. A freight train skirts the edge of a large wheat field, billowing smoke into the cloudy horizon as the farmers continue their work. Jones used muted colors in this agricultural scene to depict the dried field, the dirty and sweaty blue jeans and tan and olive work clothes, the cloudy grey sky, the train, and the farm machinery. The mural measured fourteen feet by five foot three inches before installation and has no frame.

The mural was installed on September 15, 1939. It was not varnished. The treatment recommended by the artist for cleaning called for wallpaper cleaner or a weak solution of soap and water to be used. In August, 1973 the mural's condition was assessed as good, it remains as such and according to current information has not been restored.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Anthony United States Post Office (c. 1937-1938) is being nominated to the National Register as part of the Kansas Post Office Artwork (1936-1942) Thematic Resources nomination at the local and state levels of significance under criteria A and C for its historical association with the Treasury Department's Section program and for the artistic significance of the mural that it contains. The mural, "Turning a Corner", was painted by St. Louis artist Joe Jones (1901-1963) in 1939.

"Turning a Corner" is an oil on canvas mural that depicts three farmers on a combine threshing wheat. A freight train skirts the edge of the large wheat field, billowing smoke into the cloudy horizon as the farmers diligently continue their work. Jones takes a scene which is rooted in the local economy of south central Kansas and elevates it to represent broad aspects of the American democratic tradition, the value of hard work and the integrity of American society. The farmers become slightly larger than life, representing all farmers and the dignity there in. "Turning a Corner" is representative of the regional social realism that was encouraged under the Section program.

Jones is regarded as an influential social realist painter, in 1935 he was classified among America's most gifted painters of social protest. However, his radical philosphies are not apparent in the Anthony mural, nor in the four other Section commissions that he received between 1938 and 1941. All of these murals show typical agricultural scenes of wheat or corn harvesting, projecting the image of hard working, efficient, self-sufficient farmers into slightly larger than life figures that represent all farmers. These murals were part of a much larger series of threshing and harvesting paintings produced by Jones between 1935 and 1941.
