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#### DESCRIPTION

Minneopa State Park WPA/Rustic Style Historic Resources consist of an historic district including the concentrated use area of the park and a portion of the service yard. Five buildings, one structure, and one object are included as well as two non-contributing buildings and two non-contributing structures. The park is located adjacent to Minneopa Creek which tumbles over two water falls into a deep-cut rock gorge.

#### Minneopa State Park Historic District

1. Building: <u>Kitchen & Concession</u> Builder: WPA Architect: O. Newstrom Date: 1939

The principal portion of this T-shaped building is 30' x 18' section which contains a concession and kitchen shelter. A 12' x 14' projection to the rear contains a storage area. The walls are constructed with sandstone with the exception of the gables areas, which are infilled with vertical siding, and the rear storage area which features stone walls which rise 4'5" high with rough vertical siding above. The building is covered with an intersecting gable roof.

The east elevation contains two 8' wide openings which are covered by bracketed canopies. One opening serves as a window area for the kitchen shelter while the other is a counter for the concession. The north facade also contains a 5' counter area for the concession. These openings may be closed with grooved shiplap shutters. The kitchen shelter contains four wood cook stoves, however, this area is now used for storage.

2. Building: <u>Latrine</u> Builder: WPA Architect: H. Petersen Date: 1939

The Latrine is a 32' x 18' structure which features an earth berm against the rear facade. The building is constructed with sandstone carried 4"

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below the finished grade and is covered with a gable roof. Each entry features unusual bell-shaped stone entrance screens covered with a finely detailed gable roof. The projecting gable roof is supported by bracketed posts which rise from the stone screens. Box beams,  $8" \times 12"$ , are placed above the casement windows on the east and west facades and the gable areas above this point contain board and batten siding.  $6" \times 6"$  lookouts project from the gables.

Skylights were added in a 1958 remodeling and additional interior alterations were made in 1984. The gable roof was originally covered with 24" x 1/2" cedar shingles staggered and with every fifth row doubled, however, the shingles have been replaced with asphalt.

3. Building: <u>Pump House</u> Builder: WPA Architect: O. Newstrom Date: 1939

The Pump House is a 9' x 9' one story building constructed with native stone with raked joints and features a hip roof which was originally covered with cedar shingles. The entrance door is constructed with 2 ply V-joint boards with strap hinges. The opposite wall contains a small louver opening while the remaining walls once contained nine light casement windows. The window openings have been infilled.

4. Object: <u>Drinking Fountain</u> Builder: WPA Architect: N. Averill Date: 1939

The Drinking Fountain rests on a 10'3" square stone base with cement joints over sand fill. The sandstone fountain is 3' high with a 6" step on one side. The structure is 2'5" square at the base and tapers to 2' at the top.

5. Building: <u>Picnic Shelter</u> Builder: Unknown Architect: Unknown Date: c1915

The original dimensions of this rectangular Picnic Shelter were 76' x 24'6"; however, two identical 32' x 22' wings were added at a later date which resulted in a cruciform configuration. The shelter features a steeply pitched hip roof with wide overhanging eaves with brackets resting on reinforced concrete piers. In 1967 the wooden shingles were

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replaced with asphalt and the grade was raised by two feet through the installation of a new concrete slab over the existing one. The Craftsman Style shelter is non-contributing although it may be potentially significant under a separate context.

6. Structure: Bridge Builder: Unknown Architect: Unknown Date: 1945

This reinforced concrete bridge located over Minneopa Falls is supported by a single arch. The bridge is non-contributing.

7. Structure: <u>Steps and Retaining Walls</u> Builder: WPA Architect: Unknown Date: 1937

Stone Steps and Retaining Walls are constructed on either side of Minneopa Creek and lead to the base of the falls. Typical of the labor intensive activities of the CCC/WPA, these structures cut through nearly perpendicular bluffs flanking the creek.

8. Structure: <u>Bridge</u> Builder: Unknown Architect: Dept. of Natural Resources Date: 1980s

This wooden Bridge is supported by steel beams resting on concrete abutments. It spans Minneopa Creek near the base of the falls. The bridge apparently replaced an earlier rustic style foot bridge constructed in 1939 which was built with logs resting on stone abutments. The structure is non-contributing.

9. Building: Picnic Shelter Builder: Unknown Architect: Dept. of Natural Resources Date: 1966
This rectangular, partially enclosed, picnic shelter rests on a concrete slab and is covered with a gable roof. It is built with timberwall construction and is considered non-contributing. The shelter is located in a newer section of the park away from the concentrated area of the historic district.

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Service Yard

10. Building: <u>Custodian's Cabin</u> Builder: WPA Architect: Taylor Date: 1939

The Custodian's Cabin is a rectangular T-shaped wood frame building with overall dimensions of 40'4" x 31'. The building sheathed with clapboard siding and is covered with an intersecting gable roof. All window openings are double hung sash. The residence contains a living room, kitchen, two bedrooms and bath. The living room features a massive sandstone fireplace with a segmentally arched opening and a wooden mantel. This building is not constructed in the rustic style.

11. Building: <u>Garage/Office/Tool Room</u> Builder: WPA Architect: H. Petersen Date: 1940

This 36' x 21'6" wood frame building contains two vehicle garage stalls as well as an office and tool room. The building is sheathed with clapboard siding and is covered with a gable roof. Window openings are six over six light double hung sash. Original plans called for the building to rest on a low stone base; however, the stonework was never executed and the building was not constructed in the rustic style.

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#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Minneopa State Park WPA/Rustic Style Historic Resources are historically significant for their association with the social, political, and economic impact of the Great Depression and the subsequent development of the various Federal Relief Programs such as the Works Progress Administration which was responsible for their construction. These resources are also significant for their association with the development of the Minnesota state park system. The park is representative of a number of the early state parks which were located adjacent to small towns and cities. However, these parks generally served only a local community and many were eventually transferred from the state park system to city or county agencies. Minneopa is one of the few remaining examples of this particular type of park.

Minneopa State Park WPA/Rustic Style Historic Resources are architecturally significant as outstanding examples of rustic style construction featuring native sandstone. The Sanitation Building in particular is an unusually finely crafted example of stone and timber construction. These buildings as well as the non-rustic style service buildings are characterized by nonintrusive and environmentally sensitive designs based on National Park Service design philosophy and master planning. Minneopa is one of the oldest state parks established in Minnesota with land acquired in 1905 to protect the area around Minneopa Falls for public use. The park was considered a local park which provided recreational facilities to the nearby city of Mankato.
