#### DESCRIPTION

Camden State Park CCC/WPA/Rustic Style Historic Resources consist of an historic district which includes the public use area and the service yard, all located on the banks of the scenic Redwood River. The district includes seven contributing buildings, three contributing structures, three contributing objects, as well as one non-contributing building. The architects for Camden State Park were from the Minnesota Central Design Office of the National Park Service and the Design Office of the Minnesota Division of State Parks. Both the Civilian Conservation Corps and the Works Progress Administration were active in the park.

Department of Natural Resources building identification numbers are located after the name of each building.

#### Camden State Park Historic District

1. Building: <u>Bath House</u> 4-141 Builder: CCC Architect: Edward W. Barber Date: 1935-36

The Bath House and Concession building is a 51'6" x 23' structure constructed with native split stone and covered with a gable roof. The building provided space for a concession, rest rooms, and storage areas all flanked by two loggias. Changing wings, 26' x 15', were originally located at either side of this central section. The partially enclosed wings featured low stone walls 1'4" high followed by 7'9" high vertical board and batten siding. The mens' area contained wooden benches while the womens' changing wing included individual booths.

Three concession counters opened on the main facade. The central counter is 6'10" wide and is flanked by two 4'6" counters. Four wooden brackets separate the counters and support a protective canopy.

The walls of the changing wings were razed down to the stone walls in 1978, rest rooms were added in the former concession area, and changing booths were installed in the loggias.

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2. Building: <u>Instructor's Cabin</u> 4-149 Builder: WPA Architect: Taylor Date: 1938

This 21' x 13'6" cabin was built near the Bath House as a residence for the swimming instructor. The building rests on a concrete foundation faced with stone and is covered with a gable roof with projecting lookouts. The exterior siding consists of clapboards with a 2" overlap to the sill level and rough vertical boards with 1" x 2" battens above. The entrance is covered with a gable roof supported by brackets. All windows openings are double hung sash. The cabin originally contained a living room, kitchen, and bath but the interior has been altered to serve as an Interpretive Center.

3. Structure: <u>Diversion Dam</u> Builder: CCC Architect: National Park Service Date: 1935

The diversion dam consists of a concrete wall which directs a stream into the nearby lake. The stream either by-passes the lake through a culvert or passes through a shear gate and flows toward the pool.

4. Structure: Recreational Dam & Lake Builder: CCC
Architect: Edward W. Barber Date: 1935-36

A 30' long recreational dam with 10' wing walls forms the northern edge of a small lakelet built to serve as a swimming beach. The dam consists of a 7'6" high concrete wall with a rock backing which rests on a 3 foot foundation. The wall is capped with a 1'6" section of stone. From the top of the dam a 40'6" x 5'9" boulder cascade forms a spillway leading to the river. Both sides of the cascade are riprapped. The lake is slightly less than one acre in size.

5. Structure: Bridge Architect: Taylor Builder: WPA Date: c1938

A flat "ford type" bridge crosses the Redwood River and leads from a parking lot to the beach house. The bridge is approximately 30' long and consists of a concrete slab resting on concrete footings and a central pier. The bridge is faced with native stone and is designed to withstand a washout from the Redwood River.

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6. Object: <u>Drinking Fountain</u> Builder: CCC Architect: R.A. Skogland Date: 1935

A split stone drinking fountain is located adjacent to the Bath House. The fountain is 2' square and is 3' high.

7. Building: Shelter & Concession 4-154 Builder: CCC Architect: Edward W. Barber Date: 1936

This building includes both a picnic shelter and a concession. The 43'x 24' structure features native split stone walls which rise 4'6" with rough board and batten siding above. A gable roof covers the building with 4" x 6" lookouts projecting from the gables. The shelter may be entered through three 7' openings on the north facade which are defined by 10" x 12" rough hewn bracketed posts. Of the corresponding openings on the south facade, only the central opening serves as an entrance since the building's low stone walls extend into the flanking openings. The interior features a massive split stone fireplace located on the west facade and the concession area along the east wall. The concession featured service counters on both interior and exterior walls.

8. Building: <u>Sanitation Building</u> 4-153 Builder: CCC Architect: Edward W. Barber Date: 1935

The Sanitation Building is a 29' x 18' rectangular structure constructed with local split stone and covered with a gable roof. The roof extends over an entrance screen for the womens' rest room which consists of 4'6" stone walls with 8" x 8" squared timbers which support the roof. The adjacent side wall contains a 3'6" x 11" section of board and batten siding with a screened gable above. A 13' long screen is placed adjacent to the mens' entrance. The stone screen features a 6'4" section of board and batten siding capped by a 6" x 8" timber. The entrance wall also features board and batten siding and a screened gable. The principal facade contains a screen, 2'6" high and 2' wide, with pierced openings in the stonework.

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9. Object: <u>Drinking Fountains</u> Builder: CCC Architect: R.A. Skogland Date: 1935

Two drinking fountains are located in the picnic area of the park. Each fountain rests on a round base of stone flagging. The fountains are constructed with field stone with a flat stone placed at the top. The fountains are 2' square at the base, rise 3' high, and taper to 1'8" at the top. These are the only examples in the state park system of drinking fountains constructed with uncut field stone rather than the typical split stone.

10. Building: <u>Custodian's Cabin</u> 4-160 Builder: CCC Architect: Edward W. Barber Date: 1935

The Custodian's Cabin is an L-shaped structure containing a living room, kitchen, two bedrooms, and bath. Stonework is confined to the principal facade with the remaining walls finished with rough vertical board siding with wooden pegs. The cabin is covered with a gable roof with projecting lookouts. The living room features a brick fireplace and hardwood flooring. A third bedroom was added to the rear of the building.

11. Building: <u>Warehouse & Garage</u> 4-159 Builder: CCC Architect: Edward W. Barber Date: 1935

The Warehouse and Garage building consists of a two stall vehicle garage and an adjacent shop. The 37'10" x 26'6" building is constructed entirely of native split stone except for the two exterior walls of the shop which are covered with vertical boards and battens. A gable roof with projecting 4" x 8" lookouts covers the building. The building was once covered with heavy shingles. Window openings are typically three over three light casements.

12. Building: <u>Ice & Wood House</u> 4-157 Builder: WPA Architect: O. Newstrom Date: 1937

The Ice and Wood House is a  $40^{\circ}$  x  $20^{\circ}$  gable roofed structure providing space for wood storage, a mower room, and an ice house. The rear wall is constructed with a  $12^{\circ}$  concrete wall while the remaining walls are built with split stone,  $4^{\circ}3^{\circ}$  high, with vertical fir shiplap and batten walls

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above. The stonework at the rear of the sidewalls is 8'6" high. Large double doors open to the mower room while the 10' entrance to the wood storage room remained open. A side entrance to the ice house featured doors built with double boards with an air space filled with sawdust.

13. Building: <u>Wood Shed</u> 4-156 Builder: Unknown

Architect: Dept. of Natural Resources Date: 1971

The Wood Shed is a partially enclosed rectangular wood frame structure covered with a gable roof. The building is non-contributing.

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
#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Camden State Park CCC/WPA/Rustic Style Historic Resources are historically significant for their association with the social, political, and economic impact of the Great Depression and the subsequent development of the various Federal Relief Programs which were responsible for their construction. The park was developed by both the Civilian Conservation Corps and the Works Progress Administration, two of the most popular and successful relief programs from the period. Camden State Park was considered an important link in the state park system by providing recreational facilities to a large section of middle western Minnesota.


Camden State Park CCC/WPA/Rustic Style Historic Resources are architecturally significant as an outstanding collection of rustic style buildings featuring split stone construction. The landscape design for Camden State Park is architecturally significant as a notable example of National Park Service master planning which allowed the natural topography of the winding Redwood River to determine the location of the various functional areas in the park.

Camden State Park was acquired by the state in 1934 and was officially established in 1935. The park was developed by C.C.C. camp SP-11 which first occupied the park on August 10, 1934. The enrollees were World War I Veterans and camps of this type were also termed V.C.C. camps or Veteran Conservation Corps camps. An additional 32 veterans were transferred to the camp from Missouri in 1936, yet by the end of September the development in the park had been completed. The camp was then transferred to Fort Ridgely State Park to complete development which had been left unfinished when the C.C.C. camp at that park was abandoned in October 1935.

Several W.P.A. projects were also initiated at Camden State Park after the V.C.C. camp had left. These included dismantling the camp buildings which had been located at the present day site of the campground. Three buildings in particular were moved to a remote location in the park to be used as a group camp facility. The group camp camp was dismantled in the 1960s and all that remains are two finely crafted split-stone fireplaces. The Swimming Instructor's Cabin and the Ice and Wood House were also constructed as W.P.A projects.
