National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet

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Situated on a corner lot in the heart of the city of Flandreau. the Flandreau Masonic Temple (Old Moody County Courthouse) is a massive two-story rectangular Colonial Revival building. Rising from a poured concrete foundation, the wood frame walls are covered with stucco and encircled by a three foot high brick watertable. The temple is capped by a hipped roof covered with wood shingles. A tall brick chimney rises from the northwest (front) corner. Projecting from the center of the west (front) facade is a huge pediment supported by four lonic columns. Fenestration is generally balanced consisting mostly of paired rectangular windows with one-over-one lights. A small open portico projects on the south gable end facing Second Street. A shed roofed kitchen annex juts out from the north facade. Interior space is divided into several large rooms to accommodate social functions and lodge meetings. Much of the original interior oak woodwork remains intact.

When originally constructed in 1882 to serve as the county courthouse, the building was designed in a late-Victorian vernacular style. At that time the imposing rectangular building sported a gable roof with a large gabled dormer projecting from the center of each axial facade. The gables were decorated with bargeboard. The Masonic lodge purchased the building in 1916. In 1919, a fire damaged part of the building forcing major remodeling. The Colonial Revival treatments apparently were added at that time.

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Under Criterion A of the National Register Criteria, the Flandreau Masonic Temple is significant in the area of social history, because for over seventy years it has served the small farming community as a center of social activity. Originally constructed as the first Moody County Courthouse, the building was restyled by the Masonic lodge shortly after acquiring the property in 1916. It has been a landmark for several generations of local residents. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the property relates to the historic context labeled: V. Depression and Rebuilding, D. Social Organization.

As early as 1862, Freemasonry played a role in the life of Dakota Territory. In that year the first lodge of the order of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons was organized at Ft. Randall. However, the members failed to secure a charter and the lodge disbanded. Soon thereafter the first Masonic charter in Dakota was granted to St. John's Lodge at Yankton. The order spread fairly rapidly throughout the territory. By the time of statehood in 1889, there were 73 lodges with over 3,000 members in South Dakota. North Dakota had 32 lodges with some 1,300 members.

Flandreau was first settled in 1857 by a few White speculators operating under a Dakota Land Company charter; however, they soon abandoned the townsite due to threat of Indian attack. In 1859, 25 families of Sioux Indians took up residence there. A decade later, they were joined by another contingent of White settlers. The town was officially founded in 1872. Moody County was organized the next year. Flandreau continues to host a federal Indian school and to support a significant Indian population.

Lodge No. 11 in Flandreau received its charter on June 9, 1880. At first meetings were held at various buildings throughout the town. In 1890, the lodge built the second story of a local bank building. By 1916, membership had increased dramatically and, the old facilities were no longer adequate. At that time, the lodge purchased the old county courthouse, which had been replaced in 1914. The old building, constructed in 1882 by local contractor B. Simpson, was a two-story wood frame vernacular Victorian edifice. Μ. 0n March 20, 1919 a fire swept through the masonic temple causing considerable damage. With insurance funds and volunteer labor from lodge members, the building was restored and remodeled. It was restyled with a hipped roof and pedimented porticoes giving the building a Neo-Colonial appearance. lt has served as the lodge temple ever since. The initial debt for purchase and renovation was retired in the mid-1940s. Since the founding of the lodge, and masons have engaged in a wide variety of community service throughout Flandreau and many of the lodge members have risen to high offices within the Masonic order.

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Until construction of a public auditorium in the mid 1970s, the Masonic Temple was the only large meeting place in the city. Thus, in addition to housing lodge functions, the temple has been the setting for a multitude of other local affairs including high school proms and National Honor Society banquets. It continues to be an indispensable part of the community's social organization. Generations of citizens, whether or not they are members of the lodge, have fond remembrances of activities at the temple.

The period of significance of the nominated property extends from the beginning of its use as a masonic temple in 1916 to 1939, the established 50year cut-off date for the National Register.
