Description of present and historic physical appearance:

The W. W. Gordon, III House, known as "Two Pierpont Circle," is a two-story, brick-veneered, Federal Revival house built in 1920. The property is located two miles southeast of downtown Savannah in an early to mid-20th century residential suburb. The five-bay, symmetrical front facade has a central entrance emphasized by a one-story portico and flanked by double-hung windows set within shallow segmental arches. The columned portico has a large entablature with projecting cornice and a paneled balustrade above that forms a second-floor balcony. A matching cornice and paneled balustrade encircle the eave line and hide the building's low roof (photographs 1,2,5). A one-story screened porch and sunroom are attached to one side (photographs 3,4). The interior has a central hall floor plan and retains its Federal Revival style mantels, stairway, wood moldings and paneling.

The interior arrangement of the space is essentially two rooms deep with a side sun porch and screen porch (photograph 12). The interior craftsmanship includes deep molded trim around windows and doors, seven recessed double built-in book shelves, and raised wood panels beneath every window. The doglegged staircase located in the central hall features turned and tapered balustrades, a curved handrail, and a scrolled bracket pattern on the side of each step (photograph 8). The stairway landing includes a large round arch window (photograph 13).

Each of the seven fireplace mantels are classically designed with black marble hearths. Some feature decorative motifs of urns, brass trim and elliptical shaped geometric patterns formed by radiating lines (photographs 9,10,11,14).

The house sits on an irregular-shaped lot with grounds that were landscaped in the 1950s. The property is bordered by live oaks and

pecans (photograph 1,6,7). The house was originally of natural St. Louis yellow brick, and has been painted white. A two-car garage with an upstairs apartment is located behind the house. The garage was built at the same time as the house and is of similar design. It is connected to the primary residence by a brick bordered patio. A modern swimming pool is also located in the back yard.

8. Statement of Significance

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Significance of property, justification of criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above:

Narrative statement of significance (areas of significance)

Two Pierpont Circle is significant under architecture and community planning and represents an excellent example of an early 20th century Federal Revival style of architecture and a type of model home used for a planned subdivision during the 1920s.

ARCHITECTURE

In the area of <u>architecture</u>, the house is significant as an example of the Federal Revival style popular in the early 20th century. The design is believed to have been adapted by architect Olaf Otto from the 1886 plans used by architect Detlef Lienau for the Wayne-Gordon-Low House when the third floor was added. The Federal Revival design is exemplified by the building's symmetrical design with a one-story portico featuring prominent Tuscon order columns. The portico has a large entablature with projecting cornice and a paneled balustrade forms a second floor balcony. The central entrance is flanked by double-hung 6/6 windows set within shallow segmental arched windows. The interior further illustrates the Federal Revival elements with classically designed mantels, windows and door moldings, and a decorative stairway. The one-story brick garage also built in 1920, is modest in design and features the same wide cornice line as the main house.

COMMUNITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

In the area of community planning and development, Two Pierpont Circle is significant for its construction in 1920 as the model home for the planned residential subdivision of Gordonston. subdivision streets were laid out, but only a few scattered houses were built there within the historic period. Pierpont Circle was the hub or focal point of the subdivision plan, and other streets extended off of it like spokes; this house, the model home, was the first structure built in the suburb and is a historic landmark for the area. W. W. Gordon, III inherited the land for the subdivision from his family's estate. He named the streets after members of his family, Kinzie and Gordon, and states such as Kentucky, Georgia, Virginia, and Pennsylvania. The Gordons lived at Two Pierpont developing Gordonston until his death in March, 1932. With a lien on the property that could not be paid, Two Pierpont was sold at public sale in December, The property represents a type of model home and pattern of development used for a planned subdivision during the early 20th century.

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National Register Criteria

These areas of significance support the property's eligibility under National Register Criteria A and C.

Two Pierpont Circle meets Criteria A as representative of a type of model home used in an early 20th century upper-class planned development. The community, known as Gordonston, developed from 1920 into the 1930s. Pierpont Circle was the hub of this subdivision with streets extending off of it like spokes. Only a few scattered houses were developed during this timeperiod; since then, newer houses have filled in the vacant areas.

Two Pierpont Circle meets Criteria C as a excellent example of Federal Revival style architecture popular during the early 20th century. The nominated property was built in 1920 as the model home for the newly formed subdivision of Gordonston. The home was designed by Norwegian architect Olaf Otto who patterned his design from drawings used for the Federal style Wayne-Gordon-Low house in Savannah. Symmetrically designed, the house exemplifies classical detailing from its prominent one-story portico, Tuscon order columns, and projecting cornice. Interior features illustrate classical craftsmanship particularly in the fire place mantels, moldings, and staircase design. The garage reflects a trend during the early 20th century of matching outbuilding design with the primary residence.


