

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Today the Andy Chambers Ranch is nearly as built except for deterioration and maintenance activities that have been undertaken to keep the property The mix of house and farm buildings still convey the sense of the farm/ranch that once existed there. On the farmstead there is evidence of the growth and apparent permanence sought by its previous owner as frame house has replaced the original cabin as the primary residence, but log buildings from, or similar to those of the pioneer period make up the majority of the extant outbuildings. The frame buildings at the farmstead date to the 1920s as Chambers expanded the complex during those years. The buildings include the house, an outhouse, a garage, a barn, a chicken house, a machine shed, grain storage buildings, and an oil shed Architecturally, the house and farm buildings can only be described as vernacular. Evidences of the use of pre-manufactured doors and window panels in some of the buildings are present. As these buildings are now owned by the National Park Service under life estate the occupants and/or previous owners are expending very little effort to maintain them and as a result the possibly once brighter colors are fading so that a weathered wood tone is the predominate color.

The Chambers Ranch was part of a settlement known as Mormon Row. The road that runs north and south adjacent to the complex was the historic heart of Mormon Row and remains in place in front of the ranch. Mormon Row was a Mormon line village much like the one found at Grouse Creek, Utah. In both cases the settlers attempted to maintain an orderly village as dictated by the Church while making allowances for local topography and the needs of ranching such as large pasture areas. While the central feature of village life, the church building, has been removed, its place remains apparent in a tree lined parcel of land on the road. The row, due to its proximity to Kelly and Jackson, never developed a commercial center. Instead trading was done in Kelly or Jackson. Nonetheless, a discernable community was present there that had its own identity as witnessed by a sign still in place along Mormon Row Road that says "Mormon Row 1897." The Chambers place is located near the center of this settlement, about a quarter of a mile from the site of the former church.

The Andy Chambers Ranch Historic District is significant under Criteria A in that it remains as the only nearly complete farmstead/ranch of the once densely settled Mormon Row. Its association as representative of Mormon Row is its central significance. Mormons made up the bulk of settlers that entered Jackson Hole from 1900 to 1920, making a significant contribution to the development of local agriculture and the ranch is the only one left in Grand Teton National Park that retains any of its integrity as a homesteading district property type.

The first Mormons moved to Jackson Hole during the late nineteenth century and the in-migration of members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints(LDS) to Jackson Hole continued into the early twentieth century. In 1908, as some lands north of the Gros Ventre River were returned to the public domain from Teton National Forest, Mormons, led by T.A. and John Moulton claimed the lands east of Blacktail Butte and soon others of their faith followed to the locale. Within a few years a discernable community had developed and even though it was not a town it was dubbed Mormon Row because of the religious preference of many of the settlers and the fact that they took up lands on either side of a road that ran north from the Gros Ventre River. Eventually a _DS church was built on the Row and the settlers started the process of turning pioneer farms into permanent ones. By the 1920s the frontier had passed and Mormon Row became more and more the typical rural western farm and ranching area of the 1920s.

The Chambers ranch meets the registration requirements as a homestead district property type. It retains enough of its outbuildings and as well as the main house to make its function and association with the context readily apparent. There are no inappropriate buildings or structures within the district that detract from the setting, feeling, or association of the district.


