"Beginning at the intersection of Highway 278 and Old Cotton Gin Road (Old Gaines Trace) west of Amory, run approximately 1600 feet easterly along Old Cotton Gin Road to the main gate of Cotton Gin Farm for a point of beginning, run south 140 feet more or less to a point in the farm driveway, run west 131 feet more or less to a pasture fence, run north 140 feet along the fence line to a point on the Old Cotton Gin Road, run easterly along Old Cotton Gin Road 131 feet more or less to the point of beginning. Located in Lot 2, Fractional Section 27, Township 12 South, Range 19 West. This forms a rectangle of 131' x 140'."

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The James Young Thompson House fronts the Old Cotton Gin Road (originally the Gaines Trace), less than a mile northeast of its intersection with U.S. Highway 278. The one-story, frame, vernacular Greek Revival house rests upon brick foundation piers (later infilled with brick) and is surmounted by a gable roof flanked at each end by an exterior brick chimmney. The northwesterly facade of the house is a five-bay, symmetrical composition that is dominated by a center-bay, The portico is nicely detailed with a pedimented entrance portico. molded cornice and is supported by very bold, molded and paneled box columns that are linked to the house by a balustrade of rectangularsectioned balusters with molded handrail. The box columns are echoed on the facade by plain narrow pilasters, between which the wall surface is finished in horizontal flush boards, a typical treatment for the sheltered portion of the facade of a Mississippi planter's cottage. windows are filled with double-hung, eight-over-eight sash and are closed on the facade by shutter blinds. The center-bay entrance is framed by symmetrically molded pilasters that are bridged across the top by a length of board that is molded to match. The entrance is filled with double-leaf, four-panel doors that are set beneath an unusual fortylight transom and are flanked by double-hung, eight-light sidelights over molded panels.

The interior of the house features a double-pile plan with center hall that widens at the rear to produce the regionally common "cabinet" plan. This common Mississippi floor plan derives from early houses of the Lower Mississippi Valley which typically featured rear porches enclosed at each end by small rooms, or "cabinets," as they were labeled by the French. The interior is plainly finished with simply molded door and window surrounds, unmolded baseboards, and a molded chair rail that encirles the entry hall and two front rooms to form both the sill and the apron of the windows that light these spaces. The front rooms are dominated architecturally by a pair of matching, wooden, pilastered mantel pieces, which are reminiscent of the portico columns in the boldness of their design.

The overall integrity of the house is good with significant alterations limited to the addition of a porch and pantry room to the rear elevation. No historic outbuildings survive.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The James Young Thompson House is a good example of vernacular Greek Revival plantation architecture. The house exhibits an architectural form common to the Tombigbee region of Mississippi, but, like most Mississippi vernacular houses, is distinguished by the uniqueness of its architectural detailing. The house gains added significance from its association with Cotton Gin Port, an extinct town on the Tombigbee River whose site is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The Thompson House, located about one mile north of the site of Cotton Gin Port, is the only extant building in the area that has a period of significance contemporary with the period of significance of the extinct town. Cotton Gin Port reached the height of its prosperity about the year 1848, within about a decade of when the Thompson House was built (Cotton Gin Port, Monroe County, National Register File, Mississippi Department of Archives and History, Jackson). The house fronts onto a road that was part of the Gaines Trace, an old Indian trail that was surveyed and improved to become a major transportation route from Tennessee to the Tombigbee River during the territorial period of Mississippi.

The Thompson House was built after January 1837, when James Young Thompson purchased 162 acres of what would later become a 750-acre plantation. Like many early settlers in the eastern counties of Mississippi, Thompson was a Carolinian who moved first to Alabama and then to Mississippi. A graduate of the University of North Carolina, Thompson practiced medicine in Cotton Gin Port and represented Monroe County in the Mississippi Senate from 1842-44 and 1850-52 (BIOGRAPHICAL AND HISTORICAL MEMOIRS OF MISSISSIPPI [Chicago: The Goodspeed Publishing Company, 1891], II, 902).
