Describe present and historic physical appearance.

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Badger Mountain Lookout is located on a sagebrush-covered mountaintop outside the boundary of Wenatchee National Forest over which it commands a dramatic view. Located on the eastern side of the Columbia River at an elevation of +3428, it is surrounded by private farm lands which are utilized for grazing and wheat growing. The Lookout site is virtually treeless with the exception of a weather beaten fir tree, to the northwest and uphill behind the Lookout. This tree originally served as the lookout point and in it remain portions of the original access ladder. Although the Lookout is owned by the USDA Forest Service, the site is only accessible via roads within privately The Lookout commands a sweeping view to the west, held land. across the Columbia River, which reaches from Mission Ridge to Lake Chelan with a dramatic "as seen areas" of the eastern slopes of the Chelan, Entiat and Wenatchee Mountains.

This standard Plan L-4 lookout house is situated on an 18'-0" treated timber tower constructed with 8×10 cabin girders, 8×8 vertical members and 4×6 diagonal (x-braced) and bottom perimeter members. These structural members are secured together with galvanized machine bolts. The tower base is anchored to poured in-place concrete footings with steel rods and straps and the entire structure is further held in place by a guy cable anchorage system at all four corners.

The lookout house was constructed according to the standard Plan L-4 (Revised 1932) and exhibits typical/original character defining features; a 14'x14' plan with hipped (pyramidal) roof, 1x6 (v-groove) rustic siding, an expansive glazed wall area composed of two-over-two fixed and casement type window sash, panel door with two-over-two window panel, cedar shingle roof with ornate galvanized metal ridge flashing, standard catwalk and access stair constructed with dimensional lumber and wire screening. The stair structure rests on indigenous stone, a reddish sandstone and basalt. Original T&G built-up shutters have been replaced with similarly detailed plywood type and utilize original 2x2 shutter braces and support hardware. The original lightning protection system remains in place.

The interior exhibits original lx4 T&G paneling on the walls and ceiling. Modern vinyl flooring is in place. Original standard wooden furnishings include; firefinder stand (firefinder has been removed and is stored at the Entiat Ranger District headquarters), desk/table, four benches, and two low storage cabinets and lightning stool.

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The site includes evidence of the foundation of a former garage, an old root cellar, an old flag pole location and landscaped paths and walks constructed from native sandstone and basalt. With the exception of typical shutter replacement and new flooring material, the Badger Mountain Lookout has been very little altered and remains in generally good condition.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

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Badger Mountain Lookout and site are significant for their association with the development of the USDA Forest Service and its stewardship and conservation of our National Forests, as part of a comprehensive forest fire surveillance and detection system. The Lookout is also significant as it embodies the distinctive characteristics of a uniquely functional property type designed for and most often constructed in challenging mountain terrain. Although this lookout house was relocated to this site from its original (and undocumented) location, this property meets the special criteria requirements of the Criteria Considerations (Exceptions). The property is significant primarily for its architectural value, which it continues to convey and for its association with the development of the USDA Forest Service and the stewardship of our natural resources, which it continues to possess.

Historic Background:

Concern for the protection of America's natural resources led to the enactment of the Forest Reserve (Creative) Act of 1891 and establishment of Forest Reserves administered by the General Land Office within the Department of the Interior. In 1905, the Forest Service within the Department of Agriculture (USDA) was established and assumed responsibility for the Reserves, which then became known as National Forests. Thus, the Forest Service began to develop a comprehensive system for the administration of the forests which included the construction of Ranger and Guard Stations, forest trails and roads and the establishment of fire lookout stations. Fire crews were then formally recruited and The creation of this Federal agency, however poorly equipped and meagerly financed, was a tremendously important historic advance in public attitude and recognition of natural resource conservation and the need to anticipate and rapidly respond to the threat of forest fires.

Euro-American settlement in the Wenatchee area began in the late 1860's, although the lack of railroad transportation and the geographic isolation from national markets limited settlement patterns. By the late 1880's the geographic area around Badger Mountain had been homesteaded and was in use for livestock grazing and wheat farming. By 1917, wagon roads, over which current paved routes follow, transversed this area of Douglas County. A dramatic contrast in geology differentiates Douglas County, on the eastern side of the Columbia River and Chelan

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County on the western side. Thus, the gently rolling wheat fields and grasslands on Badger Mountain provided a dramatic vantage point allowing a clear view of mountainous and forested areas in Chelan County. Thus, it seems likely that Badger Mountain may have been used for fire surveillance purposes prior to any recorded Forest Service use of the site.

By 1922, official Forest Service maps noted that a "TREE" and a triangulation (i.e. firefinder) station were in use on Badger The lookout station appears to have been easily accessible via roads from East Wenatchee. The "TREE" and triangulation station notations continued to be noted on Forest Service Maps until the mid-1930's, although records from 1932 indicate the presence of a "permanent" lookout and "TREE" in use for "emergency" purposes. Haven Stayaway, who worked for the Forest Service on the adjacent Entiat Ranger District during this era, reported that a tent camp and tree were in use c.1938. Forest Service records reference archival correspondence which indicate that Hans Holt, the long time owner of the immediate homestead, donated the site to the Forest Service c.1941. Service correspondence, dated February 1947, regarding the relocation of the Martin Lookout to Steliko Point states;

"This system of moving a Lookout House from one station to another has proved successful since it has been done in two other instances on the Forest, such as Badger Mountain and Beehive."

There are no definitive records regarding where the Badger Mountain Lookout House originally stood, although it clearly exhibits intact character-defining features typical of standard Plan L-4 lookout houses which were constructed throughout Wenatchee N.F. during the C.C.C. era. This lookout station was actively manned by the same lookout, Oscar Richardson, between 1953 and 1972 which may explain its generally intact and unaltered condition.

Badger Mountain Lookout continues to be used by the Forest Service for emergency purposes and was actively manned during the 1988 Dinkelman Fire over which it commanded a dramatic view and from which the fire could be monitored. A particularly unique site feature is the original lookout "TREE" which remains in close proximity to the lookout house.
