

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This two and one-half story wood frame residence sits on a large lot $(90' \times 160')$ at the southwest corner of Locust and Eliza. It anchors the east end of the Academy Hill block. Locust is the crest of the hill in this part of town, and the house faces to the north, overlooking the Maquoketa River valley. In the nineteenth century, East Locust was known as "Society Hill." It was lined with large residences. Many of these have been replaced by new houses, and a number of the fine late nineteenth century designs have been altered through the application of new siding, enclosing of porches, etc. Though the neighborhood contains a number of fine houses, the sense of time and place necessary for a historic district is not there.

The Lydia Johnson residence (either 1894 or 1896) appears to be a textbook example of Free Classic Queen Anne design. Two and one-half stories tall, the central part of the house has a hip roof, with projecting gabled wings. The northwest corner features a rounded bay which extends above the roof level, ending with a conical, or tent, roofed tower. A wrap-around porch is found across the facade and part of the west elevation. A second floor porch rises from the roof of the first floor porch. Porch supports are neo-classical columns on rectangular wooden bases. Windows are primarily rectangular, but are often grouped in threes. An oval cameo window is found on the west elevation. No architect has been definitely identified for this house. Locally it is said that a Davenport architect was responsible for the design. Another source identifies W.J. McGinnes of Omaha, though it is not known if McGinnes was the architect or contractor. There is no doubt, however, that the Johnson house is the best example of Queeen Anne design in the community.

A number of historic photographs exist of this house. Some alterations are apparent. Finials are missing from the roof, the brickwork on the chimneys has been simplified, and the railing (balustrade) is missing on the front porch. Despite these changes, the house retains a high degree of integrity. A garage, c. 1920, is located on the southwest corner of the lot. It is not intrusive.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This residence is significant under criterion C as a fine example of Queen Anne design from the 1890s. The Lydia Johnson house represents the "Boom Years" in the truest sense...an elegant "high style" house on a hill overlooking the business district.

At first glance, this house might be considered a design by Knoxville, Tennessee architect George F. Barber. However, the various owners over the years have mentioned having original plans for the house, and often mentioned that the architect was from Davenport. Other times, an Omaha firm has been mentioned. The plans have not been located for this nomination. It has all of the characteristics that are common to a large Queen Anne house of the period: complex irregular massing, corner tower, wrap-around porch with small porches at the second floor level, windows of varied shapes and sizes, textured exterior surfaces. It is a classic design in this style. The present two car garage appears to have been built c. 1915-20, though it does not clash visually with the Quenn Anne residence. The integrity of the lot has been retained.

There is little doubt that the money to build this house was made during the "Boom Years" of Maquoketa's development. However, little has been learned of the Johnson family to substantiate this. The architectural significance is of primary importance.


