Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Oskaloosa Fire Station is a three story building of dark brown brick (laid in running bond) on the north side of Second Avenue West, immediately adjacent to the City Hall. On the facade (south elevation) it features three large segmental arched openings at the street level for the fire engines. The second and third floors have three pairs of windows with stone jack-arched tops. Stone string courses are located at sill level on both floors, and a wider string course is found just below the corbelled brick cornice. Corners of the building are stone quoined. The four and one-half story bell tower features the same jack-arched windows and stone quoins ( the tower was designed and built at the same time as the Fire Station, but received its copper roof when City Hall was built three years later). The east and north elevations of the Fire Station are of red orange brick laid in common bond. The windows have segmental arches. First floor windows feature 9/9 sash, while shorter windows on the second and third floors are 1/1. The hip roof is of red tile.

The Fire Station has an alley on the east side, a drive on the north that connects Market Street with the alley, and City Hall is attached on the west side. The Fire Station and City Hall are located one block south of the Square, and both are included in the City Square Commercial Historic District.

The plans for this building on file in the Wetherell & Ericsson office were drawn by Frank E. Wetherell when the firm was Wetherell & Gage. Both floor plans and elevations are available. These show that the third floor was originally to have been added when the City Hall was built at a later date. There are few differences between the plans and building as constructed. This project has dealt primarily with the exterior of the Wetherell designed buildings, and the nominations are based on exterior significance and integrity. Exterior alterations appear to be limited to new garage doors.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Oskaloosa Fire Station is significant under Criterion C as a good example of Wetherell's public building design from the early 20th century (as noted in the "Works of Frank E. Wetherell: 1892-1931" context), and illustrates the concept of phased development. This building was designed to be built before the City Hall, but the two were to match. There has been a great deal of confusion over exactly who designed both the City Hall and Fire Station. S.B. Sinclair, a local contractor who sometimes advertised himself as an architect, has often been credited with the design of both buildings. This confusion evidently arose because of the length of time between the drawing of the plans, and the actual construction of the buildings. Records show that plans for both of these buildings from 1905 are on file in the Wetherell & Ericsson office, but only the 1908 plans for the Fire Station have been located. These plans are so close to the building as constructed that there can be no doubt as to the architect.

In July 1908 the <u>Weekly Herald</u> headlined on page one, that "Oskaloosa Will Erect Building...New Home for Fire Department is Ordered...A part of City Hall."

Oskaloosa will have a new fire department building erected this year..... The plans will in the main follow those made heretofore in that the new department will be erected on the east end of the lots owned by the city at the corner of Market and Second Avenue and will be a part of the city hall that will be constructed on the other parts of the lot later on....It will have ample provisions for the fire and ambulance or patrol aparatus and will contain the apartments of the men and stables for the horses and places for the feed, etc.





Some modifications will be made from the plans made for the new fire department three years ago, but the ideas developed at that time are carried out in the main.

The 1905 plans were drawn by Frank E. Wetherell, after a great deal of discussion with the city council as to cost. No information has been located as to exactly why it took three years to begin construction of these new municipal buildings. One newspaper article noted that the contract called for the architect to "change and revise the plans and drawings until absolutely in harmony with the idea of the building committee." That in itself may have taken three years. The members of the committee had visited fire stations in Des Moines, Marshalltown, Waterloo, and Ottumwa before approving these plans.

It is important to note that Wetherell continued to be involved with Oskaloosa projects even in the early years of his Des Moines residency.

The Oskaloosa Fire Station meets the integrity requirement set out in the Multiple Property Document for Wetherell related works.
