Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Lincoln (Elementary) School is a single story rectangular building with brick walls that vary in color from tan, to medium, to dark brown. It is the only building on the square block bounded by B and C Avenues West, and H and I Streets North, and is located on the south half, with the long side of the rectangle facing south. Short wings on each end project slightly. Entrances are located on the front of these side wings. The roof of the side wings is flat, while that of the central part is gabled, with a projecting center gable in the front. The roof originally was of red tile, but is now asphalt. The facade of the building features lavish terra cotta decoration. Though much of this is cream colored (such as the quoins), the detailing around the doors, and in the medallions utilizes wonderful colors. The medallion in the center of the south elevation is of Abraham Lincoln, while the medallions on the wings feature a young boy on the west wing, and a young girl on the east. The entrances have identical designs surrounding them: An elaborate terra cotta pediment includes a date panel (A.D. 1921), foliated rinceau, rosettes, tassels, and even two very wise looking owls. The long narrow panels down the side of each door contain circles with the letters of the alphabet: A through M down the left side; N through Z down the right. Between the letters near the top of each side, are found the numerals 1 through 0. Additional terra cotta panels are found on the facade, many of these are tall slender panels extending down from the roofline, while others are keystones and cornerstones above the round arched windows in the center portion of the building. The highly decorative quality of these terra cotta details is both elegant, and whimsical. At the southeast corner of the building, the very bottom terra cotta quoin is inscribed

The only apparent alteration to this building is the installation of new, energy efficient windows, and doors. While this is distracting, the overall quality of the building is such, that the windows are not intrusive.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Lincoln School building is significant under Criterion C because it is representative of the late work of Wetherell (as noted in the "Works of Frank E. Wetherell: 1892-1931" context), and because of the richness of the architectural detailing. It also represents a new type of school building. William Wagner (member of the Wetherell firm from 1960 until his retirement in the late 1980s) says that this building was the first modern single story school built in the state. The floor plan is an open one which allows a maximum of light and air into each classroom. The gymnasium, manual training, and domestic science areas, were all fairly new concepts at the elementary level in 1921.

The lavish use of terra cotta on the facade is a characteristic of Wetherell that is seen on other buildings from the teens and twenties. A notable example is the 1917 Masonic Temple in Grinnell (part of the Grinnell Historic Commercial District, NRHP). The terra cotta details on the Grinnell building display a wide range of colors, similar to those on the school, but the details pertain to the Masonic organization, and do not have the charming quality of those on the elementary building. Terra cotta provided the architect with the vehicle to add richness to a functional structure.


Lincoln School was one of the last commissions for Wetherell in Oskaloosa. A few years later his firm was involved with the high school stadium project, but much of that has been altered. The Lincoln building retains an unusually high level of integrity for a school building and meets the integrity requirements set out in the Multiple Property Document for Wetherell related works.




