The Rose Building is believed to have been built around 1912 in the community of Chena, located at the confluence of the Chena and Tanana Rivers, approximately eight river miles southwest of the city of Fairbanks. Between 1925 and 1927, the building was moved to its present location at 520 Church Street in Fairbanks. It is a good example of a log commercial building in Fairbanks.

In the 1920s, the Rose Building was a three story log building that measured 50 feet long (east/west) by 36 feet wide. The third story is tucked under a steep gabled roof. To increase that floor's interior space, small shed dormers were centrally placed in the south and north elevations. The building was constructed of full logs with vertical corner boards. The gabled ends are 2 x 6 frame construction with shiplap siding. The roof has 2 x 8 rafters placed on 24 inch centers that are exposed externally. The rafters are covered with wood sheathing and corrugated metal roofing.

The south elevation, parallel to the Chena River a block away, is the main facade. On the ground floor there are two doors placed at the right end, a single door in the center, and a single door at the left end. Between the doors are storefront windows. These windows consist of four lights with the bottom two approximately twice as high as the top two. The second floor has four sets of two 1/1 double-hung sash windows that are side by side. These are placed asymmetrically and do not relate to openings in the wall below. The third floor has a centrally placed shed dormer that has three 1/1 double hung sash windows placed side by side. At present, two of the windows are missing.

The original west elevation (gabled end) has a large storefront window to the right of center on the ground floor, two sets of two 1/1 double-hung sash windows placed side by side at one-third points on the second floor, and two 1/1 double hung sash windows spanning the gable wall's centerline on the third floor. Small metal vents are centrally located above each of the gable wall windows. The original east elevation appears to have been similar to the west.

The Rose Building, moved from the dying neighboring community of Chena to Fairbanks in 1925, is associated with the development of the interior Alaska city during the 1920s. For more than fifty years, the Rose Building has stood on its present location in downtown Fairbanks and has been used for commercial purposes. It is a representative regional example of large-scale log construction during the early twentieth century. It is also the last log commercial building in Fairbanks that is still used for its original purpose.

The Alaska Railroad connecting Fairbanks with a year-round port was completed in 1923. Although the selection of Fairbanks as the northern terminal was never in doubt, it was the death knell for the community of Chena eight river miles away. Many businessmen moved buildings from Chena to Fairbanks. In 1925, the three-story Rose Building was moved from Chena to a lot adjacent to the new railroad depot and used as a restaurant.

Fairbanks economically declined during the 1910s, but the railroad, the new Alaska Agricultural College and School of Mines (today's University of Alaska Fairbanks) that opened in 1922, and the arrival of the Fairbanks Exploration Company (F.E. Co.) to undertake large-scale gold mining in 1924, revived the town's economy. Shortly, Fairbanks would become the center for aviation in northern Alaska as well.

By 1925, the F.E. Co., a subsidiary of the United States Smelting Refining and Mining Company, had become the largest contributor to the economy of interior Alaska, a position it held until the outbreak of World War II. The company started construction of its central offices, machine shop, and

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The building's original north elevation had a door in the center and a door on the left side of the first floor. Original window configuration on the first floor is unknown. The type and placement of the second floor windows mirror those of the south elevation. The small shed dormer in the center of the third floor has one 1/1 double hung sash window. A six-inch diameter metal chimney penetrates the gable roof just to the right of the dormer. Two porches were added to the north elevation when the building was placed on its lot in Fairbanks. A small open porch was built off the central door. A larger porch enclosed the door on the left side.

Between 1949 and 1959 three alterations were made to the building. A wood frame two-story addition measuring 12 feet by 36 feet was attached to the east elevation, covering all but the gable wall. This addition has a flat roof and wood siding. The addition's north elevation has a 1/1 double hung sash window centrally placed on the second floor. On the east elevation, three windows are evenly spaced along the second floor. The addition's south elevation has a door on the left side and a large single pane window on the right side of the first floor. This large window is square except for the northeast corner which is rounded.

The second alteration is a lean-to addition along the north elevation that incorporated the two porches added in 1925. The wood frame lean-to has shiplap siding and a corrugated metal roof.

The third addition is a wrap-around wood canopy on the south and west elevations. This canopy is supported by chains attached to the building at the top of the walls.

The additions do not interfere with the original architecture of the building. The exterior of the building is being renovated to its 1940s appearance. The interior has been gutted and will be rehabilitated for commercial uses.

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warehouse complex in 1926 at a site only a few blocks away from the Rose Building. Businesses in the Rose Building flourished.

Over the years the Rose Building housed a variety of successful commercial ventures, among them a restaurant, barber shop, and hardware store. The City of Fairbanks surveyed the Garden Island vicinity where the Rose Building stands in 1934. Louis Rose, for whom the building is named, acquired the property in October 1938. Today, the Rose Building is the only remaining log commercial building in Fairbanks.
