Description

The Kregel Wind Mill Company building in Nebraska City is a single-story rectangular loft-type building constructed of light frame materials with a flat roof. A shed-roofed wing on the north rear extends nearly the full width of the building. The south front facade displays four bays of large round-arched windows and/or garage doors set within rectangular panels. The building is clad in brick-impressed sheet metal, capped with a simple metal cornice. At the rear of the lot is a one-story urban outhouse. This nomination includes two contributing buildings.

Located at the western commercial end of Nebraska City's historic main street, the Kregel Wind Mill Company building is a one-story flat-roofed structure measuring 14.5 by 24.5 meters. Constructed, c1905, of light wood-frame, the large open space is divided into two longitudinal bays by a central north-south row of columns. The columns support a central beam upon which light wood roof joists are supported; the joists also rest upon the east and west outside walls. Two diminutive monitors are located in the center of each bay toward the rear of the north-south center of the building. The monitors mark significant interior work places and provide additional vertical space for equipment power drives which are all extant.

The interior space is unfinished except for the 4 by 5 meter office located in the southeast corner of the building. The office displays large borrow-lights to the interior factory space on both its west and north walls. It is completely finished with original furnishings dating from the early years of occupancy; storage cabinets still house the company's records. The loft or factory space also houses all of the tools, equipment, furnishings and materials from the earliest period of occupancy, as well as those accumulated over a half-century of manufacturing and supply.

A one-story wood frame storage shed and garage, of unknown vintage, is attached to the rear of the building; its length is nearly the width of the main building. A detached urban outhouse is located just off the alley.

The front wall of the building is clad in brick-impressed sheet metal, capped with a simple sheet metal cornice. Principle focus of the facade is on the large openings arranged in four bays--two windows and two wagon doors--which display large round-arched lights set within decorative rectangular panels. A single, original pedestrian door disrupts the formal rhythm of the arched lights, which provides entrance into the corner of the interior office space.

Statement of Significance

The Kregel Wind Mill Company is significant at the state level, and potentially eligible at the national level, under Criterion A for its association with manufacturing and agriculture. Beginning in at least 1890, the Kregel Wind Mill Company (then called the Nebraska City Manufacturing Company) began selling windmills in the Nebraska City area. Although their main product, the Eli windmill, was not widely marketed, the building is of special significance. The factory today remains completely intact with equipment and parts appearing as they probably did when the firm was in operation. This leaves the Kregel Wind Mill Building as a unique example of what was once an important part of the nation's history. The period of significance is c1905 when the firm began operating at its present location.

From the mid-nineteenth to the mid-twentieth centuries, hundreds of windmill factories operated in the United States, each of them producing their own varieties of standardized water-pumping windmills. A small number of the plants, such as the Aermotor Company in Chicago and the Baker Manufacturing Company in Evansville, Wisconsin, were large facilities. The majority of the windmill factories, however, were facilities like that of the Kregel Wind Mill Company of Nebraska City, Nebraska, housed in a single-story building and using castings prepared by foundries in the vicinity.

The early history of the Kregel Wind Mill Company is less than clear. It certainly had its beginnings as the Nebraska City Manufacturing Company, but it is not clear when George Kregel began working for the firm or whether windmills were one of the items it produced. The 1882-1883 Nebraska State Gazetteer and Business Directory lists the Nebraska City Manufacturing Company and identifies J.S. Miller as the secretary. Advertisements in the Nebraska City News indicate the company made and sold farm equipment, but does not mention windmills.

Lack of information on the windmills and George Kregel persist for a few years. The trail picks up again in the 1886-1887 Nebraska State Gazetteer and Business Directory where George Kregel is identified as the secretary and manger of the Nebraska City Manufacturing Company. Mr. H. F. Cady is listed as president and the firm is identified as selling plows and cultivators. Additionally, advertisements in the Nebraska City News make no mention of the company dealing in windmills.

The next change occurs in the 1890-1891 Nebraska State Gazetteer and Business Directory. George Kregel is identified as the manager of the Nebraska City Manufacturing Company located at 1405 Central Avenue. No other names are listed in connection with the firm. Also in 1890, the newspaper contains advertisements indicating the company was selling windmills.

In 1893, the Nebraska City Manufacturing Company ceased to exist, but George Kregel continued to produce windmills and pumps at the same address. The gazetteer does not list a name for the operation, but advertisements in the 1893 newspapers call it "A Plow Factory." For the next several years there were no apparent noteworthy changes, and when change does occur next, the date must be (closely) approximated. An advertisement in a 1905 newspaper states that Kregel's company is on the corner of 15th and Central Avenue. This change is further clarified and substantiated by a 1906 Sanborn map that lists the firm's address as 1416 Central Avenue. The 1907 gazetteer (copies of the gazetteer are not available between 1903 and 1907) confirms this address.

Additional changes occur in the 1913 and 1915 gazetteer. In the 1913 issue the firm's name is officially listed as the Kregel Wind Mill Company. The later issue has basically the same entry except that it describes the company's product as "Eli Windmills."

In Nebraska, thirty-seven historic windmill companies (including Kregel) have been identified (Baker, 1985). Although there were some large operations such as the Dempster Wind Mill Company of Beatrice, most were smaller firms. Additionally, many of the companies lasted less than ten years. Unfortunately, an adequate buildings survey has not been done to determine what resources still exist. The Kregel Wind Mill Company, like most in the state, was a relatively small operation and it did not use salesmen or agents. As a result, the Eli Windmill was not widely used outside of the southeast Nebraska area even though the

company was in operation for more than fifty years. The primary significance of the company, therefore, is not because of its size or the widespread popularity of the product.

Rather, the building is significant on a statewide level as a representative of the small windmill manufacturing concern which played such a prominent role in the agricultural development of Nebraska and the Great Plains. If it had not been for the water brought from the ground by the windmill, agriculture in much of the Great Plains would have been impossible. The windmill has been described as making "the difference in time of drought between the family who was able to hold on and the one that had to give up."

The integrity of artifacts associated with the building greatly enhances this statewide significance. In the opinion of windmill historian T. Lindsay Baker, the integrity of associated artifacts renders the building as it exists today potentially significant at the national level, because it is the only small-scale factory in the nation that remains intact; with equipment and parts appearing as they probably did when the factory was operating. Baker further states that although other similar operations exist, none remain intact with their historic contents and all have been converted to twentieth-century manufacturing or alternative uses. This leaves the Kregel Wind Mill building as a unique example of what was once an important part of the nation's manufacturing and agricultural history.
