Description

The First Presbyterian Church was constructed in 1927. It was designed by architect Norman F. Marsh. The building is constructed in the Spanish Colonial Revival architectural style with Churrigueresque style influences and represents the Southwestern Regionalism property type. It retains integrity of design, materials, workmanship, and feeling. The First Presbyterian Church has been in continuous use as a church from 1927 to the present day.

The First Presbyterian Church faces south onto Monroe Street. The site is characterized by concrete and grass surfaces, a lushly planted courtyard and mature palm trees. No outbuildings are located on the site.

The First Presbyterian Church is a "U" shaped, two-story building of cast concrete block construction. The building is divided into the church, a classroom wing, and a meeting room wing framed by an arcaded walkway. It measures 100 x 100 feet. The gable roofs are covered with asphalt shingles. It has a concrete foundation.

Exterior features include the dominant, five-story stepped tower with octagonal upper stories, and the walls, constructed of massive concrete blocks. Important decorative elements include the Churrigueresque entrance surround constructed of cast stone, porthole gable windows and finials at the bell tower parapets. The interior of the sanctuary features beamed ceilings, iron chandeliers, and built-in furnishings.

Statement of Significance

The First Presbyterian Church is significant under Criteria C in the area of Significance of Architecture. Designed by Los Angeles architect Norman F. Marsh and built in 1927, the First Presbyterian Church is a good local example of the Spanish Colonial Revival architectural style with Churrigueresque style influences and therefore represents the historic context "Religious Architecture in Phoenix, 1910-1942." The building is a good illustration of the Southwestern Regionalism property type. The building possesses the important characteristics of the property type specifically a design concept based on the revival of the traditional Spanish Colonial architectural themes found throughout the Southwestern United States.

The dominant visual and stylistic characteristic of the building is the massive cast concrete block walls, built to imitate sandstone construction. Another element that conveys the building's stylistic imagery is the simply detailed gabled roofed elements grouped around a courtyard. The church forms one wing of the complex and is distinguished by a large, offset belltower and a gable wall facade. The central, arched entrance is detailed with typical Churrigueresque cast stone ornamentation. Above the entrance is an ornamental rose window. The belltower, with its stepped, multi-story configuration, is a strong stylistic element of the building. The courtyard is enclosed on two sides by one and two story wings. An arcaded walkway along the street facade provides formality to the courtyard space and further lends to the stylistic image of the building.
