Description:

The First National Bank (1918) is a two story brick rectangular building located on the SW corner of Washington Avenue and Stevens Street. It measures 22'x90' with a 22'x 32' single story addition at the rear (1957). The primary facade is located on the narrow end of the rectangle which faces Washington. The bank is Neo-classical in style with a temple front. When the bank opened the blue-black exterior was described as being "of Hy-tex Mission Chinchilla face brick with granite and cream full enamel satin finish terra cotta." The main entrance is flanked by monumental terra cotta free-standing Corinthian columns resting on granite bases. Brick pilasters of the same dimensions are located on the corners, and feature terra cotta bases and elaborate Corinthian capitals. The main doorway features a terra cotta surround with a rich variety of Neo-classical details: Egg and dart, bead and reel, rosettes, and a full denticulated entablature above. Windows above this front entrance also feature a terra cotta surround and are crowned by a festooned frieze. The columns appear to support a simple terra cotta cornice, above which is a brick frieze featuring terra cotta rosettes directly above the columns and pilasters. A full entablature with rich Neo-classical detailing completes the temple front. A brick parapet tops the building, broken by a star-patterned balustrade at regular intervals. The granite base, brick parapet, terra cotta cornice, and brick pilaster treatment continue around the secondary facade (east elevation) with two story windows placed between the pilasters. The terra cotta festooned frieze also continues between the pilasters. The side windows have the same terra cotta surrounds found on the front, with star-pattern panels between the two stories. The tall slender first floor windows are separated by fluted pilasters with a hybrid shell capital, and a three paneled frieze above these windows features urns and a foliated design. The terra cotta detailing on this building is so rich that the producer, the American Terra Cotta Company, featured a drawing of one of the capitals in its company publication, Common Clay.

It appears that the only exterior changes are the installation of new front doors and the time/temperature sign. The single story addition to the rear is of the same brick and should not be considered intrusive.

From an historic interior photograph and floor plan, it appears that the major alteration was the moving of the cashiers' counters from the east side to the west side of the lobby at an undetermined date. These counters are of "green veined cream colored marble with a ten inch Westfield green marble" base. The lobby and vestibule walls are wainscoted with the same green veined cream marble. Woodwork is of "Tobasco mahogany". Originally the floor was of ceramic mosaic tile, but this has been carpeted. The ceiling and walls are richly ornamented with plaster beams and relief designs. This lavish plasterwork has been maintained over the years.


In recent years the bank purchased the building immediately to the west. Although the two buildings are now connected by doorways, the integrity of the 1918 building has been retained. The basement, reached by an outside stairway, was originally used as a barber shop and is now a community meeting room. The second floor contains offices.





Significance:

The First National Bank (1918) is locally significant under under Criterion C as a fine, relatively unaltered, example of Neo-classical bank design from the second decade of this century, and is of local historical interest because it demonstrates the strong economic growth in Iowa Falls at that time. The period of significance is the date of construction.

Architecturally this building is a superb example of Neo-classical bank design. The bank selected the Lytle Company of Sioux City as their architectural firm. The Lytle Company specialized in bank designs although they did other building types as well. It is known that they designed at least twenty-five banks, primarily for Iowa communities, but also in Minnesota and South Dakota. One of their highly publicized designs was for the First National Bank of Maquoketa (NRHP), a double-wide building with a full terra cotta facade. While the Lytle Company favored the Neo-classical style for their bank designs, each bank was individually designed. The Iowa Falls bank shares some characteristics with those in Mapleton and Manchester, but the treatment of the side windows and the facade is slightly different on each. The architectural firm was able to achieve a rich surface pattern through the lavish use of terra cotta with special colors of brick.

The Commercial Bank of Iowa Falls was established in 1882, and a brick building constructed for its use in 1884. That building was on the site of the present bank at the SW corner of Washington and Stevens. At that time the name was changed to First National Bank. Original officers and stockholders included such well known Iowa Falls names as L.F. Wisner, E.S. Ellsworth, L.O. Bliss, and Mrs. Helen Nichols. At a later date E.O. Ellsworth served as president for many years. In 1917 it was decided to replace the two story brick building with a more modern one. The bank placed a large ad in the Hardin County Citizen explaining that

We wrecked a perfectly good building...at one time the best business block in the town and which might have been made to answer for many more years...largely for the purpose of carrying out the policy of the management in keeping just a little ahead of the times in civic and public improvement.

Our new building is a milestone in the progress of our city and is just another evidence of our faith in Iowa Falls and the people of this community. We believe in the future of Iowa Falls and feel that with its loyal citizens and thru the assistance of the successful farmers in our surrounding community, our city will grow and continue to grow, reflecting the intelligence, industry and thrift of our people.

This was in the period of growth not only of the business district, but the entire community. The newly paved streets, new bridges across the river, and new residential neighborhoods illustrated the prosperity of the community. There was a new Federal Building, and the Episcopal parish had just built a new church, St. Matthew's by the

Bridge. The bank was just one of several new commercial buildings along Washington during that decade. The McClanahan Building, the Rex Theater, Cuplin Block, and Dougan's Garage all were part of this growth. This prosperity did not last however, and on December 21, 1932 the First National Bank closed its doors. The city was without a bank until the Iowa Falls State Bank was organized and opened on May 25, 1933, in the building formerly occupied by the First National.

The First National Bank of Iowa Falls is a very good example of bank design from its period and it retains a high level of integrity.
