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### SUMMARY

The Magnolia Service Station, circa 1930, is a vernacular example of the "house" style of service station, which became popular during the later 1910s. The station is located on Route 66 in Texola, Oklahoma, a small community only a few miles from the Texas-Oklahoma border. The building is located on the main thoroughfare, a sparsely populated street with a few vacant commercial buildings. The building is a small, rectangular box constructed of "cast stone" concrete block. A canopy extends over both the concrete block office building and the original location of the gasoline pumps and is supported by two round, metal pipes. Attached to the east side of the building is a singlebay garage sheathed with clapboards. The Magnolia Service Station retains its historical integrity.

## DESCRIPTION

The Magnolia Service Station comprises an ornamental concrete block building and a small, single bay clapboard garage. The ornamental concrete blocks have a rock-faced stone pattern. The front facade of the building has a single, centered, paneled wooden door with a single, double hung wooden window on either side. A large plywood canopy serves as protection from the weather and extends over both the pump station and the entire concrete block building. The canopy is constructed of three-foot wide plywood sheets and is supported with round, metal pipes. The west side of the building has a single window and a single door.

Attached to the east side of the building is a one-story, single bay garage with clapboard siding. It has a wooden garage door and a single, fixed window on the east elevation.

### ALTERATIONS/ADDITIONS

The date of construction for the Magnolia Service Station, determined through personal interviews, has been established as circa 1930. However, there are no written records which indicate the date of construction of the garage or the canopy. The type of construction indicates that the canopy was built during

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the 1940s or 1950s. The clapboard extension was probably added sometime during that period as well. The right window of the original station has been boarded over. The gasoline pumps have been removed. The concrete block building continues to retain its historical integrity in spite of additions and alterations.

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### SUMMARY

The Magnolia Service Station, built circa 1930 on Route 66 in Texola, Oklahoma, is historically significant as an example of an early station located on the route in western Oklahoma. The station is a vernacular example of the "house" style of service station. Simply designed, the building is similar to many vernacular structures erected in small towns along Route 66 to house gas stations. Contextually, it relates to "Commerce on Route 66 in Oklahoma (1926-1944)." The associated property type is Filling Stations, Service Stations and Garages, subtype "House."

#### HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Magnolia Service Station, located in Texola, was one of the first service stations on Route 66 that travelers encountered on the western end of the route through Oklahoma. The Magnolia Petroleum Company was first incorporated in 1911, with the majority of their oil activity concentrated in Texas. In 1913, the company began exploration in the Oklahoma oil fields and was so successful that in 1919, a divisional office in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma was opened. Route 66 was not paved in western Oklahoma around Texola until June 1931. The Magnolia Service Station was built just prior to that date in circa 1930.

The Magnolia Service Station in Texola sold Magnolia products until 1955. Early advertisements of the 1930s were varied but encouraged the automobile driver to "Knock out that knock, use Magnolia Ethyl Gasoline." Although the business depended on selling Magnolia gasoline, other profits came from selling tires and chains to travelers for motoring over the unpaved sections of Route 66 in western Oklahoma and into the Texas panhandle. There also was money to be made in providing a wrecker service to stranded travelers when the route was muddy and wet.

Originally owned by Albert Hutto, the Magnolia Service Station was later sold to Frank Skinner, who continued to sell Magnolia gasoline and products. In 1955, Steve Hogg purchased the business and changed the station's affiliation to Phillips 66. The service station continued to sell Phillips 66 products until Hogg sold out in 1980. At that time, Jerry Harrison bought the station and changed it to a Fix It Shop, mainly repairing flats, and then closed its doors only a few short years after taking over its operations.

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Similar to other stations along the route, the Magnolia Service Station offered one restroom for the travelers convenience. Another aspect of the service station was Magnolia's vernacular interpretation consisting of a crude canopy which was probably inspired to offer shelter for attendants and customers from the scorching sun in summer and the bitter cold in the winter while filling up with gasoline.

The Magnolia Service Station building continues to maintain its historical integrity.
