7. Description

Narrative Description

This Queen Anne style, wood frame house is situated on a 4.1 acre lot near downtown Fayette, Alabama. The house has a two-thirds wraparound porch with posts and lace-like brackets. An outstanding feature of the house is a hexagonal shaped tower with a bell-shaped roof. This feature, along with the two-thirds wraparound porch sets the house apart from all others in our The house has one-and-one-half stories and is rectangular area. The house is painted white and has a green shingle in shape. There are two bay windows, one located on the south wall, roof. and one on the west wall. The roof lines are high pitched and irregular with ten gables. Six of the gables have imbricated shingles. All doors are original four panel doors with original hardware. There are a variety of window styles, including two over two and four over four double hung sash. Three dormer windows were added in 1994 to provide lighting and to meet fire code safety regulations for the attic rooms.

The interior features a central hallway that provides access to the rooms on the north and the south of the house. The front and rear entrances have matching four panel doors with side lights and transoms. The window in the dining area is located in an arched niche, the arch being the handiwork of the builder. Beaded tongue and groove wainscoting is an outstanding feature in the hallway and two rooms on the north side of the house. Grooved interior trim and circular medallions were used on many of the doorways and windows. A beautiful oak mantle with barley twist detail is located in the northeast room. It surrounds an old gas burning heater insert in the fireplace. A mantle and built-in bookcase is located in the northwest room. The fireplace in the northwest room also has an old gas burning heater insert.

There is one outbuilding that originally served as a carriage house. The construction of the carriage house coincided with the construction of the house in 1898. It features a central area for carriages, a tack room to the south and a horse stall to the north. Above the central carriage area is a loft. The building is made of wood with weatherboard exterior and a tin roof.

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Originally, the ceilings were 14 feet. They had been lowered to 10 feet throughout the house and sprayed with a textured layer. We removed the dropped ceiling, restoring them back to 14 feet. We installed sheetrock and wide crown molding in keeping with the period.

The heart pine floors had been painted and/or covered by carpet. We removed the carpet and carefully sanded the floors to remove paint and glue residue. Then a protective layer of polyurethane was applied.

Two wall partitions were removed to accommodate the last occupants use in 1985. At some point, the partition between the kitchen and dining area was removed and cabinets with a bar were installed. The cabinet/bar area was removed and the missing wall partition replaced to restore the character defining space.

Two commercial type restrooms had been added in 1985 at the rear entrance. This completely denied exit and entrance to the house and porch from the rear. These bathrooms were removed and the rear entrance to the house and porch restored.

On the east and north portion of the wrap around porch, the posts, brackets and balusters had been replaced with brick pillars, tapered posts, and square balusters. These did not match existing original posts on the west side of the porch. These features were removed and replaced in kind to replicate the original design features.

For the new use, we found it desirable to take in the attic. We did this without compromising the integrity of the main floor. We created three bedrooms and two baths in this area. It was therefore necessary to add a staircase and three dormer windows to meet fire code safety specifications. The staircase was carefully integrated into the central hallway so that it did not obstruct doorways or walkways. The dormer windows were intricately hand crafted to match the original imbricated gables on the house.

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Two bathrooms had to be added on the main floor for the new use. These were added on the north side of the wrap around porch. The baths extend five feet onto the porch, leaving a four foot walkway to maintain the integrity of the porch. Two stained glass windows were installed, one in each bathroom. These were in keeping with the Victorian theme.

The area underneath the south side of the house is a basement which originally served as a kitchen/cellar between 1898 and 1900. It was constructed of wood and plaster with windows opening to the south and east. At later unknown date, the walls were replaced in part by concrete blocks and In 1994-1995, the the floor covered with scored cement. partitions constructed by the last occupants were removed. Partitions were relocated for the new use. Waterproofing steps were taken to deter moisture and mildew problems which had deteriorated this part of the house. Moisture resistant sheetrock and mildew resistant paint were applied to the walls and ceiling. The floor was cleaned and painted with mildew resistant paint and a protective layer of polyurethane For the new use, the basement area was converted applied. into an en suite bedroom and laundry room.

The alterations that were made were all an attempt not only to accommodate the new use, but mainly to retain and restore the integrity of the house back as close to original as possible.

The house is situated on the northwest corner of a wooded lot. When it was constructed in 1898, it was three blocks from downtown Fayette. The town is now gradually expanding toward the residential area. It is the only house of its kind in Fayette. The yard is currently, as well as in the past, casually landscaped. Low growing shrubs line the front of the house. A patch of pansies along the walkway was added in 1994. Exterior lampposts were added for the new use. There are beautiful hardwood trees lining the 200' walkway. These trees were planted by the son of Edward Rose soon after the construction of the house. Three large magnolia trees and a wild dogwood tree add beauty to the lot. A 300' driveway extends from the carriage house to the street. Originally it consisted of an eroding clay and

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gravel mixture. In 1994, a washed aggregate layer was applied to simulate the gravel drive and to prevent further erosion. The south side of the driveway is partially lined with crepe myrtle bushes. Wild hydrangeas and day lilies grow on the southeast corner of the property.

Through much hard labor, research, and expense of time and resources, a part of Fayette County history has been saved.

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#### 8. Statement of Significance

The Edward Rose House, constructed in 1898, is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C with the area of significance being architecture. The one-and one-half story, wood frame building is a good local example of the Queen Anne style of architecture and a landmark within the small town of Fayette. Its design elements include a wraparound porch, a hexagonal tower with a bell-shaped roof and imbricated shingles in some of its gables. The house suffered some unsympathetic alterations over the years, but has recently been sensitively rehabilitated. This Queen Anne cottage retains a high degree of architectural integrity.

Although the community was established in 1821, the Edward Rose House is one of the few extant buildings that predates 1911 when a disastrous fire destroyed much of the downtown area.<sup>1</sup> The significance of the Edward Rose House as an important local articulation of the Queen Anne style of architecture is thus enhanced because of the style's rarity in Fayette.

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Historical Summary

Mr. Edward Rose, the original builder and owner of the Edward Rose House, played an important role in the upbuilding and prosperity of the city of Fayette. He was a resident of Fayette for approximately 70 years, residing in the Edward Rose House for approximately 55 of those years. Solid and substantial as a businessman, Edward Rose was the proprietor of one of the leading mercantile houses of this area. Due to his good name and sound business judgement, Edward Rose was held in high esteem by the community.<sup>1</sup>

Edward Rose was not only a well respected merchant but a man of high civic consciousness. Included in his civic activities were serving as trustee for school and school property in 1890 and again in 1900, stockholder in company to build a school in 1895, postmaster in 1896? town councilman 1912 - 1914, and mayor 1918 - 1920.<sup>3</sup> While serving on the town council, he was instrumental in initiating the construction of a system of water and sewers.<sup>4</sup> Prior to Mr. Rose taking office as mayor in 1918, the city of Fayette was suffering financially. By the end of 1919, the financial status of the city had recovered to the point that city debts were paid and a surplus of funds remained.<sup>5</sup> The leadership and business expertise of Mr. Rose contributed to the financial recovery of the city.

During the years that Edward Rose resided at the Edward Rose House, he continued to be vital in the commercial and civic progress of Fayette. The restoration of this house helps to preserve a part of the heritage of the city of Fayette. Local residents have displayed a vast amount of interest and pride in this endeavor to preserve a piece of Fayette's history.
