GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Constructed after 1878, this is a 1 and 1/2-story, frame building, which was used as a meeting house for most of its history. It features a gable-end facade. The side walls feature 4/4 double-hung window sash. A 1-story rear wing features a shed roof. The building's original clapboard is now clad with cover-up siding. The front entryway might be a replacement.

CHURCH

The footprint of the Spring Creek Meeting House/H Street Mission measures approximately 30' x 50'. The building rests on a stone foundation, is of balloon frame construction, and is clad with asbestos siding over the original clapboard. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A brick chimney is situated at the rear of the building.

The interior of this building contains an area of about 1,500 square feet. It features very old (and probably original) wood molding around windows and doors. This woodwork is plain and simple. The floorboards are wide, very old, and perhaps original to the building. None of the original pews remains, and their configuration within the building is not known. The interior features two rooms, one in the main building, and a small room comprising the wing on the west, which might have been used by the elders. There is no platform in the sanctuary. The interior wall finish is plaster. There is no basement to this building.

Although the cover-up siding is visually distracting to this building, it appears to be reversible. The front entrance to this building is probably a replacement. While it, too, is distracting, it appears from the interior that the building originally featured only one, centrally located facade entrance. In this sense, the replacement front door did not change the original entryway configuration (separate entrances for men and for women and children evidently were not in the original design). Although these alterations exist, the overall integrity of the building is very good, particularly because wood is fragile and the changes in use for the building have not radically altered its interior.

SITE

The Mission is located about one-half block north of A Avenue West (U. S. Highway 163). The lot measures 40' x 52' (width by depth), and the building faces east. The surrounding land use is generally residential. Although relatively small in scale, the Mission projects a somewhat prominent visual appearance in the neighborhood because of its massing.

There are no other improvements on the lot except for the Mission itself.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built circa 1880 and relocated to its present site circa 1895, the Spring Creek Meeting House/H Street Mission possesses historic significance, under National Register Criterion A, because it calls attention to events and patterns associated with Quaker religious institutions within the historic context "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa." The first meeting at the Spring Creek site took place in 1844 and illustrates the rural nature of early Quaker settlement in Oskaloosa. The later relocation of this building to Oskaloosa shows the growing centralization of this sect's activities away from the countryside and into that city. This meeting house is also historically significant because its later function as a mission calls attention to the growing evangelical nature of the Iowa Yearly Meeting.

The Spring Creek Meeting House/H Street Mission is also architecturally significant, under National Register Criterion C. The gable-ended facade configuration of its roof with its steep pitch shows a distinctive shift from earlier Quaker-designed meeting houses in Iowa, characterized as "long, low," by one historian (Jones:258).

The period of significance, under Criterion A, for this meeting house is twofold. The first, circa 1880 to circa 1895, embraces the time it served as a rural meeting house. The second, circa 1895 to circa 1945, the time it served as a Quaker mission in Oskaloosa. The period of significance, under Criterion C, is circa 1880, the time the building was originally constructed.

Criteria Consideration (Exception) A applies to this nomination. It is satisfied because this religious property derives primary significance because of its architectural distinction, as well as its historical importance in calling attention to events and patterns, both within the historic context "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa."

Criteria Consideration (Exception) B also applies. Although the Spring Creek Meeting House/H Street Mission has been removed from its original location, it is the surviving structure most importantly associated with the Schism of 1877 and its outcome.

The property contains one resource for this nomination--the meeting house.

EVENTS AND PATTERNS

This meeting house was originally associated with the earliest Quaker settlement in the Oskaloosa vicinity. The building originally stood in Section 9 of Spring Creek Township, the site of the Spring Creek meeting. It was constructed sometime soon after a fire in 1878, which destroyed the first Spring Creek meeting house and its 1863 addition constructed for the Iowa Year Meeting.

The Spring Creek Monthly Meeting was one of the two predecessors of the present-day Oskaloosa Monthly Meeting. Following the merger of the two meetings in 1894, meetings were no longer held on this site. Subsequently the decision was made to relocate the building into Oskaloosa, to its present

site at 207 North H Street. A mission of the Oskaloosa Monthly Meeting was then established, using this facility, to stimulate and encourage membership in a neighborhood on Oskaloosa's west side.

The meeting house obtains historical significance because it illustrates the evangelical nature of the Iowa Yearly Meeting after the Schism of 1877. After relocation, it was used as a mission church. Iowa Quakers were the first members of the sect to proselytize in an effort to counteract membership decline on the frontier. A meeting explicitly founded as a mission would have been an anomaly among Eastern Friends, but it serves to illustrate a basic tenet of the Iowa Yearly Meeting. In this sense, the Spring Creek Meeting House/H Street Mission is eligible for nomination to the National Register, under Criterion A, as situated on its present site.

ARCHITECTURE

This building obtains significance because it calls attention to the transition from the side-gabled facade to the gable-ended facade among Quaker meeting houses in the Oskaloosa vicinity. Coal Creek Meeting House (now located on the Nelson Pioneer Farm) illustrates this earlier design in the area. Its side-gable, low pitched roof indicates this provenance, according to Jones, *Quakers*, pp. 258-259. (See Section E, page 15, in the cover document for this nomination.) The design of the Spring Creek Meeting House, however, reflects a mainline American vernacular design for a building constructed for religious purposes.

This building is one of the oldest of the Quaker resources of Oskaloosa still extant. Churches are not easy to use adaptively and frame buildings are particularly fragile. For these reasons, the survival of this building is particularly noteworthy.

REPRESENTATION IN OTHER CULTURAL RESOURCES SURVEYS

This meeting house was surveyed in 1981 as part of the Area XV Regional Planning Commission's then comprehensive cultural resources surveys of Mahaska County. The Historical Survey of that project identified the building as "the most visible building in Mahaska County which calls attention to the traditional Quaker value of simplicity" (Page 1981). Although the Architectural Survey of the project evaluated the building as a "C" resource (not eligible/intrusion), this survey noted that it "must be viewed in terms of building type, not style. Further research recommended to determine interior integrity, and presence of extant 19th c. meeting house" (Naumann).

POTENTIAL FOR HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGY

Although the site's potential for archaeological research is, as yet, unevaluated, there appears to be little if any in this regard on the present site. At the former site, however, there exists potential for archaeological research. Foundation and/or footings for this building, as well as the previous meeting house, might be identified. There also exists the possibility that other resources on this rural site, such as a privy, might be discovered and yield significant information.
