GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Located in the northwest quadrant of the City of Oskaloosa, which was heavily settled by Quakers, this is a 1-1/2 story, frame, single-family dwelling. It features an ell shaped footprint with a wing at the rear. The facade features a porch and 1-story bay window with a gable-end roof. Windows have 1/1 double-hung sash. Some windows are paired on the second floor. All windows have low-arched millwork lintels. The house has a side gable roof with an intersecting facade gable and intersecting facade gable dormer.

The integrity of this building is very good. The building retains its original clapboard, which is not masked by cover-up siding, as is so often the case with Oskaloosa dwellings. The porch and bay window additionally retain most of their original materials.

HOUSE

The main portion of the Spurgin Residence measures approximately 30' x 26 feet' (width by depth) with a 14' x 10' area forming a portion of the el on the facade. A wing at the rear of the building measures approximately 12' x 18'. There is also a small modern enclosed porch at the rear of the building and another modern enclosed porch on the east side near the rear.

The building rests on a brick foundation. Of balloon frame construction, the house is clad with clapboard siding. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

On the interior, the floors of the first and second stories are softwood, now covered with wall-to-wall carpeting. Interior walls feature plaster finishes, with some modern paneling installed. Four rooms are situated on the first floor. Four rooms are also situated on the second floor, each of which is a bedroom. The basement is unfinished and features a concrete floor. The house possesses no attic.

Although there is some settling of the porch and other maintenance needs, the condition of the house is generally good.

SITE

A one bay garage stands at the rear of this property to the north.

The Spurgin Residence is situated on a portion of Lot 8 in Mendenhall's Addition to the City of Oskaloosa. This plat was laid out in only a few lots, each of which was subsequently subdivided. This parcel measures 50 feet on College Avenue and 164 feet on Penn Boulevard and occupies a corner location.

When Penn College purchased this property, the institution effectively extended the Yale Row configuration of its campus along College Avenue.

The site of this property is generally level in topography. The Iowa Yearly Meeting House-College Avenue Friends Church is located directly across College Avenue to the south from this house. North Market Street is situated approximately two blocks to the east, and Penn Boulevard, which forms the west boundary of the property, runs four blocks north to the new-site campus of William Penn College.





SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built circa 1895 as a single-family dwelling, the Spurgin Residence possesses historic significance, under National Register Criterion A, because it calls attention to events and patterns associated with Penn College within the historic context "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa." The Spurgin Residence illustrates the importance of domestic science within Penn College's curriculum during the first decades of the Twentieth Century and the significant role women have traditionally played in this institution. The Spurgin Residence is also significant, under National Register Criterion C, because its siting contributed to the Yale Row configuration of Penn College's old-site campus.

The period of significance, under Criterion A, for the Spurgin Residence is 1916-circa 1936, the time Penn College occupied the building for domestic science instruction and it served as student housing. Under Criterion C, the period of significance is 1916, the year Penn College acquired the building.

The property contains three resources for this nomination--the house, which is contributing, the garage, which is noncontributing, and the site, which is contributing.

This is a good example of a vernacular single-family dwelling constructed during the late Victorian era. Although it is an attractive representation of the type, the building does not obtain sufficient architectural significance for nomination, under National Register Criterion C.

EVENTS AND PATTERNS

The Spurgin Residence is a fine example of a "practice house" used for instruction in home economics. A wide-spread educational trend in the first decades of the Twentieth Century, the so-called "Cottage Plan" employed single-family dwellings as laboratories for practical experience in domestic science and home economics for women students.

Penn College purchased this house shortly after the May 1916 fire that destroyed Main Building. The location of the house directly east of the campus provided a convenient facility for temporary purposes. Immediately after the fire, members of the Domestic Science Department had used the kitchen of the College Avenue Meeting House, but these proved to be close quarters. In the search for space to hold classes, the college decided to use the Spurgin Residence as a practice house for the Domestic Science Department. The college installed laboratory desks with individual gas plates for each student to use.

In the years immediately preceding World War I, other colleges in Iowa also employed the Cottage Plan. At Iowa State College in Ames, for example, several practice houses were constructed to provide home economics students facilities to implement their studies with practice (Page:1992).

The Spurgin Residence also possesses historical significance because it calls direct attention to Elizabeth W. Edwards' directorship of the Domestic Science Department at Penn College during the 1910s. Elizabeth and her husband, Penn President David M. Edwards (1910-1917), also illustrate

one of the many husband and wife teams who have taught at Penn over the years, an example of the Quakers' respect for the equality of women.

While the practice of shared teaching enabled Penn College to take advantage of the skills and talents of faculty wives and enabled women to contribute to education, it also may have resulted from the institution's proclivity to thrift and close financial management. (The careers of Rosa Lewis, Ella Stokes, and Cassa Conover provided better examples of this phenomenon.)

Finally, the Spurgin Residence possesses historical significance because it provides an example of off-campus housing for students. In the 1930s ownership of the home passed from Penn College to the Rice family, who lived in this home. Helen Rice graduated from Penn College with the class of 1939. In addition, the family rented the upstairs to some male students. Both Don Ackley and Delmar Underwood lived there in the 1930s. Others may have as well (Personal communication with Martha Berry Johnson).

The siting of the Spurgin Residence possesses architectural significance. Although erected as a single-family dwelling, its acquisition by Penn College added another element to the Yale Row configuration of the college's old-site campus in reinforcing its linear siting established by Main Building and the President's Cottage

REPRESENTATION IN OTHER CULTURAL RESOURCES SURVEYS

The Spurgin Residence was surveyed in 1981 as part of the Area XV Regional Planning Commission's then comprehensive cultural resources surveys of Mahaska County. At that time, the Historical Survey did not identify or evaluate the building within the context of education in Oskaloosa. The Architectural Survey evaluated the building as not eligible for nomination, under National Register Criterion C. In the intervening years, more information has come to light regarding the Spurgin Residence and its place within the historic context "The Quaker Testimony in Oskaloosa, Iowa."

HISTORIC NAME

The historic name for this property, Spurgin Residence, appears to have been that employed during its period of significance by Penn College. This is noted in the *Penn Chronicle* of October 4, 1916. Derived from a previous owner, that person's full name is not included in this nomination's historic name because the building's significance derives from the college rather than the individual.

POTENTIAL FOR HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGY

Although the site's potential for archaeological research is, as yet, unevaluated, there appears to be little if any in this regard.
