Description

The New Providence School gymnasium is a two story round building, constructed of hollow tile blocks with a brick exterior. It was constructed in 1935-36 as a PWA project in a pared down PWA Moderne style. Although it was not the first round gym in Iowa, it was the first one of this size and was the most modern one in the area. The gym is located on the school grounds on the north edge of New Providence, Iowa.

The main part of the building is circular. It has a double wall constructed with thirteen inch hollow clay tile blocks with a brick exterior. The exterior brick are of varying shades of dark red. The tile were furnished by Adel Clay Products, Co. of Des Moines, Iowa. The diameter is eighty-five feet. It has a rectangular entrance pavilion that is equipped with two slightly projecting bays with some vertical decoration in brick.

The entrance is on ground level and is open to the full height of the building with windows on three sides. On either side of the entryway are two wooden staircases going up to the landing to the gymnasium and down to the lunch room.

The upper floor holds the basketball court, a stage and bleachers. The basketball court is 72 x 38 feet. The dome roof is about 35 feet from the floor at its highest point and requires no supporting pillars, being constructed with steel beams. The stage sits on the south wall of the building with a 42 1/2 foot front and originally was fully equipped with footlights and colored border lights. Across the gym floor are the wooden bleachers which originally seated 300. This includes the balcony area above the bleachers. The bleachers come right to the edge of the basketball court. Beneath the bleachers is a storage area. Nine windows are along the north wall above the bleachers. The lower half of the gym wall is constructed of red clay tile, while the top half is of varying shades of tan clay tile. Every fourth course is a bonding course, creating an interesting pattern.

Description (continued)

The basement was left unfinished at the time of construction. In 1937 it was finished and includes boys' and girls' locker rooms along the north side, a music room on the south side, a lunch room in between with the kitchen at the west end. The main room is 38 feet by 70 feet. The kitchen measures 38 feet by 12 feet. The basement has eight supporting steel columns spaced evenly throughout the main room. The floors are poured concrete. The walls are of red clay tile blocks.

There are two staircases and exits on either side of the kitchen with the stairs going up to the gym.

In 1949 an underground cellar was constructed for surplus food storage. This is connected to the kitchen on the west side and entrance is gained to the cave from the kitchen.

The building has had no major structural changes. It is basically the same today as it was in 1936. It is structurally sound and in very good condition. Major repairs needed include the roof, windows, and the heating system.

Statement of Significance

The New Providence School gymnasium is locally significant under Criterion C as a good example of PWA Moderne design; as an example of a relatively rare building form; and as an example of the design work of Keffer & Jones, a Des Moines architecture firm that specialized in PWA school buildings.

The New Providence school gymnasium was one of 32 PWA school buildings planned by Keffer & Jones, Architects of Des Moines, Iowa. J.E. Lovejoy Construction of Des Moines was the contractor. Its style is the PWA Moderne typical of the numerous federal government buildings of the 30's and 40's. Its most significant feature is that it is a round structure.

This building was constructed in 1935-36 as a PWA project under the first appropriation of Federal Grants. It is believed to be the first round building built specifically as a gymnasium in Iowa. The gym is constructed of thirteen inch hollow tile with a brick exterior. The main part of the building is round with a low pitched dome roof. The entrance is a rectangular pavilion with two slightly projecting bays.

The building was so unusual for its time that people made fun of it. However, it was the first and most modern gym in the area and hosted all the basketball tournaments in the area.

Verbal boundary description

The precise verbal boundary of the New Providence School Gymnasium is a circle with the circumference of 267 feet. The rectangular entrance on the east extends fourteen feet beyond the closest point of the circumference and is 40 feet long. The southeast corner of the entrance measures 300 feet from the southeast corner of the entire property.

Verbal boundary justification


This nomination includes only the gymnasium and its rectangular entrance. All other structures excluded.

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


