#### Narrative Description

Sitting on a corner lot on Center Street in Springville, the 1896 Nephi and Annie P. Kindred House is a one-and-a-half story, Victorian Eclectic central-block-with-projecting-bays house. It has a fully landscaped yard with mature trees. A short wide concrete ballard sits to the east of the entrance sidewalk and an iron fence with square brick piers runs along the west side of the yard.

The walls of the house are a salmon colored brick, common on similar buildings in Springville, laid up in a common bond. The walls are supported by a roughly dressed sandstone foundation. The projecting bays all are capped with gable roofs; in the pediment of each gable are Queen Anne-inspired wood fishscale shingles. The front entry on the south facade of the house is sheltered with a wood framed porch, supported by turned wood posts. Decorative spindle work under the eaves of the porch was added in 1989. The front wood paneled door is crowned by a leaded transom window. The windows on the west elevation appear to have had segmental arches over the window heads which have been replaced at some time with heavy stone lintels. Asphalt shingles cover the roof, which is surmounted by two brick chimneys.

The most visible alteration to the building is a 1-1/2 story, front-facing gable roofed garage addition to the east of the house, constructed in 1989. This addition echoes the original building in its brick on the first story and wood shingles in the gable end. Paired french doors appear in the gable end of the garage on the facade and a pair of sliding windows are in the gable end of the garage on the north elevation. A wood-framed glassed-in breeze way connects the garage addition to the house; this breezeway is set back from the plane of the south wall of the house, making it less prominent. In sum, although the addition is large in mass and thus impacts the character of the historic building, care has been taken to disturb historic building fabric as little as possible and to make the addition compatible in style and materials to the original construction. Overall, the integrity of the house is maintained and it contributes to the historic qualities of Springville.

The only other building on the property at this time is and out-of-period gazebo located west of the house. A single cell brick summer kitchen shown on a 1925 Sanborn Map and in 1988 photographs was removed in 1989 to make way for the aforementioned addition.

### Narrative Statement of Significance

The 1896 Nephi and Annie Kindred House, nominated as part of the "Historic Resources of Springville City" Multiple Property Submittal) is significant in the broad patterns of Springville history as an example of the larger, more substantially constructed homes built in Springville during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. As detailed in the "Historic Resources of Springville City" Multiple Property Submittal, these buildings reflect the growing prosperity and sophistication that the arrival of the transcontinental railroad (in 1869) and other links to communities outside Utah brought to Springville. In contrast to Springville's early buildings, which were simple, utilitarian buildings most often constructed of locally produced materials, the Kindred House was constructed of fired brick, with Victorian Eclectic stylistic features. Contact with the outside world brought awareness of popular architectural styles, such as the new eclectic Victorian styles exhibited on the Kindred House, to Springville. Buildings such as this house were the result of such awareness.

Springville City, in Utah County, Utah, was settled in September, 1850 by a company of pioneers of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (LDS or Mormon Church) led by Aaron Johnson.<sup>1</sup> The colonizing families had crossed the plains during the summer as part of a train of 135 wagons captained by Johnson. Upon arriving in Utah, they were called by church leader Brigham Young to establish a permanent community on the banks of Hobble Creek, in Utah Valley. The suitability of the area for settlement and agriculture had been noted earlier by William Miller and James Mendenhall, who had traveled the length of Utah Valley during the winter of 1849.<sup>2</sup>

The pioneering period of establishing Springville as a viable community was followed by an era of growth and diversification of industry and commerce. Promotion of the organized cooperative movement may have helped to initiate this new phase of development. The greatest impact, however, was brought by the railroad. Completion of the transcontinental rail line in 1869 ended Utah's geographic isolation, linking the state to the products and markets of the entire nation. It made goods from the outside more readily available, created new markets for Utah-produced commodities, stimulated commerce and the development of new industries, and brought in more settlers together with more outside influences. The pioneer period, with its emphasis upon basic essentials of community survival, self-sufficiency, and cooperative group effort, was brought to a final close.<sup>3</sup>

Springville was uniquely affected by the coming of the railroad in two respects. Initially, building of the rail lines led to the city's emergence as a major center for railroad construction contracting businesses. Later, with a network of routes in place, rail transportation became a chief factor influencing industrial

development in and around Springville. The city enjoyed certain advantages with respect to transportation systems in that it was strategically located geographically. A short distance to the north was Salt Lake City and the major transcontinental rail link between the east and west coasts; to the east, through Spanish Fork Canyon, lay the extensive coal fields of Carbon County; to the south was a direct route to the ore deposits of Iron County and Los Angeles, beyond to the southwest.

By the early 1900s, Springville had grown to a city of approximately 3,500. The 1911 R.L. Polk & Co. Directory shows Springville to have two banks, fourteen grading contractors, three hotels/rooming houses, one flour mill, one canning factory, and a municipal electric power plant. There were four general stores in operation: G.S. Wood Mercantile Co.; Deal Bros. & Mendenhall Co.; Packard Bros. & Co.; and I.T. Reynolds & Co. Principals in the latter three firms also were prominent in the field of railroad contracting. Springville was served by two railroads: the Denver & Rio Grande Western, and the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad of the Union Pacific system.

The Nephi and Annie Kindred House, built amid this unprecedented period of growth in Springville, was constructed in 1896 for their family residence. Andrew Berkley, an active mason in Springville at the time, was the mason for the house. As detailed in the September 4, 1896, edition of the <u>Springville</u> Independent:

Nephi Kindred, the well-known blacksmith, is also having a neat four-room cottage built on his place in the Third Ward. This will be one of the pretty cottages of the city and represents some of the skillful mason work of that knight of the trowel, Mr. Andrew Berkley. Each mortar joint is neatly pointed up with a round finish and the foundation stones are trimmed up to a proportionate square and nicely painted. The carpenter work is being done by Mr. Reuben Richardson, who, with Mr. Berkley, took this contract, furnishing the plans, material and labor aggregating an outlay of about \$1,200, which compared with 1890, would represent a \$2,500 house.<sup>4</sup>

As noted in the article, Nephi Kindred was a well-known blacksmith in Springville in the 1890s. He apparently was a son of Edmund H. Kindred, original owner of the property on which 188 W. Center St. was built.<sup>5</sup> In 1888, Nephi Kindred had married Annie Pennington in Logan, Utah. She continued to reside at 188 W. Center St. following the completion of the house. Nephi, however, died before the house was completed.

Born in England in 1862, Annie P. Kindred was a daughter of Edward and Catherine Birchell Pennington. The family came to Utah in 1872 as LDS converts. During her lifetime, Annie Kindred was active in LDS Church work, including Primary, M.I.A. and Relief Society. She was an honorary member of Camp Spring Creek of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers.

In 1935 Annie sold 188 W. Center St. to her daughter and son-in-law, Harriett and Myron N. Crandall. She continued to live with the Crandalls in the house until her death in 1950. The Crandalls had lived in the house since 1909, the year they were married.<sup>6</sup> Myron N. (Pep) Crandall was a lifelong resident of Springville, and a grandson of pioneer Springville settlers Myron and Susannah Wimmer Crandall. Prior to his marriage, Pep worked for a time as a teamster. He subsequently worked in construction, which he pursued until his retirement. He was employed as a contractor c.1911, a construction foreman c.1929, a crusher operator for Strong & Grant Co. c.1935, and a construction worker during the 1940s.<sup>7</sup> Pep resided in the house until his death in 1968. Harriet continued to reside in the home built for her mother and father until 1983, when the current owners, Glenn L. and Afton B. Alleman purchased the house from her. The Allemans have expanded the house while maintaining a respect for its historical character. In 1989, the Allemans constructed a 1-1/2 story garage addition to the east side of the house, separated from the original portion by an enclosed breezeway. Other than this addition, the house remains much as it was when the <u>Springville Independent</u> noted its construction in 1896.
