GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This is a 2-1/2 story, frame building. Built circa 1887, this single-family dwelling features a hip roof with intersecting gables, brick foundation, front porch and side porch, canted bay tower at the southeast corner, and 2-story bay window on the south elevation. It is situated on one and one-half city lots. Although slated for demolition as a public nuisance in the 1980s, its present owner has preserved the essential integrity of this building and restored it to service.

HOUSE

Roughly speaking, the footprint of this consists of a rectangle, which measures approximately 24' x 35' (width by depth). A facade porch stands on its east elevation. It is covered with a front gable roof supported by classically-inspired columns, and contains an unenclosed area of 70 square feet. A rear porch is a later addition to the building and probably dates from the first decade of the Twentieth Century. It is enclosed and contains 192 square feet.

The building is covered with a front gable roof with intersecting gables on the north and south elevations. The gable on the south covers a 2-story bay window and a gable on the north covers a 2-story wing to the main block. Two front gables are situated on the facade directly below the main roof. Although a steeply-pitched roof surmounting the canted bay is nonextant, the present owner plans to rebuild it.

A number of architectural features call attention to the roof system. They include wide eaves, brackets, and corner returns on the lower two front gables on the facade

The building rests on a brick foundation. Of balloon frame construction, the building is clad with original wood siding on the first and second floors with original shingle siding in the gable ends of the roof. The roof is covered with cedar shingles. One brick chimney is situated on the ridge of the main hip roof of the house. A second brick chimney is located near this ridge but further to the rear of the building.

Fenestration is original to the house and generally features 1/1 double hung sash windows. The facade and canted bay feature large-paned windows surmounted with smaller panes in colored glass on the first floor and on the second floor.

In the interior, the first floor and second floor each contains a total area of approximately 1,528 square feet. Floors on the first and second floor are of hardwood. The house has an attic, which features softwood floors and plaster wall finishes. The basement, which is full, features a concrete floor and unfinished walls.

At one time, the Hatton House contained five apartment units. Many alterations were made to the building during these conversions, including the lowering the ceiling in the attic, constructing a second egress stairway between the attic and the second floor at the center of the house, and installation of hot air ductwork throughout the building. The present owner has removed the lowered ceiling in the attic,

removed the intrusive stairway and made the requisite structural repairs, removed the ductwork, and installed a one-pipe steam heat system in the building. According to the Engineering Department of the City of Des Moines, this is the first residential steam heat system installed in the city for many years.

The present owner has also installed new plumbing and electrical wiring systems in the building, rebuilt the wood gutters on the roof, and replaced five of the six large, divided-light windows in the building with units designed to match the remaining one, including the colored glass of the upper lights.

Recently the Hatton House has received a \$17,000 grant from the Historic Resources Development Program (HRDP), administered by the State Historical Society of Iowa, to rebuild the chimney, install cresting and finials on the roof ridges, rebuild the steeply, and make repairs and paint the exterior of the building. The overall cost of these projects amounts to \$30,000. (Teri Toy Informant Interview)

Presently, Hatton House is in very good condition.

SITE

This house is situated on Lot 1 and the north one-half of Lot 2 in Block 11 in Polk County Homestead & Trust Company Addition. Lot 1 measures 50' x 132' (width by depth) and the fractional portion of Lot 2 measures 25' x 132' (width by depth). These parcels of land are located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Jefferson Avenue and 7th Street. The house stands on the west side of 7th Street and faces east.

The Hatton House is situated entirely in Lot 1 of this parcel. The fractional portion of Lot 2 provides additional privacy from the single-family dwelling located at 1724 7th Street, immediately to the south.

The 1901 Sanborn fire insurance map shows a rather large 1-1/2 story carriage house or barn at the rear of the property. The 1920 fire insurance map also pictures this resource. It might also have been the garage, which measured 14' x 24' and was noted by the Des Moines City Assessor's Office with "1900" as its date of construction. This building is nonextant. The location or locations of a privy, which might once have stood on this site, is unknown.

The immediate surroundings of the Hatton House are generally level in topography. Within two blocks to the north, 7th Street slopes steeply into the Des Moines River valley. The feeling of the immediate area is residential. Although 6th Avenue is situated only one block to the east and is densely built-up with commercial and multi-family dwellings, this feeling of density rapidly changes into single-family residential as one moves west. Sixth Avenue serves as an artery into Des Moines' central business district from the north and carries heavy traffic flow. Land use to the west and east of this site remains, however, residential.

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



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



SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built circa 1887 as a single-family dwelling, the Hatton House possesses architectural significance, under National Register Criterion C. The building calls attention to suburban architecture in the former City of North Des Moines, particularly to the canted bay subtype of the Stick Style with Italianate influence, as practiced in that Victorian suburb. Refer to cover document.

The period of significance, under Criterion C, for the Hatton House is circa 1887, the year in which it was completed.

The property contains one resource for this nomination-the house.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Located within the Polk County Homestead & Trust Company's addition in North Des Moines, the Hatton House was part of a successful real estate venture known as Prospect Park. (Chapter III of the cover document for this nomination discusses that venture in detail.) Platted in 1887, this addition was the earliest unit within Prospect Park, a large and multi-platted Victorian residential park. Prospect Park made a major contribution to community development in North Des Moines as a section of residential preference.

The large size and the many architectural embellishments employed in the Hatton House illustrate a notable success for the developers in attracting quality improvements to this addition. When the building was subsequently sold in the early Twentieth Century, it was described as "well located and a beautiful piece of property. *Price \$7,000*." (See Continuation Sheet 7-7.) The substantial price of this property is another indication of its quality. As exemplary of the residential quality the promoters wished to attract, the Hatton House likely helped promote further improvements of a comparable character in the area.

It is thought that Adams and Hastie, a local real estate and insurance agency, built the house, based on the size of their mortgage in the building's abstract of title. Because neither of these names is listed in the city directories at this address in the 1880s, it is safe to assume that they built the house as a speculation.

ARCHITECTURE

The Hatton House stands as a fine example of the Stick Style, particularly the canted bay subtype of that mode, as practiced in North Des Moines during the late Nineteenth Century. It remains one of about five of these subtype examples retaining a great deal of original ornamentation and is the only example with a full three-story tower.

Believed to have been completed in 1887, this residence is largely Stick Style in terms of stylistic influence but exhibits influences drawn from the Italianate mode as well. The Stick Style influence is
