KNOX, MAINE

The Pleasant River Grange No. 492 is a rectangular, two-story, gable roofed frame building that is clad entirely in wood shingles. It stands on a granite block foundation in a relatively isolated part of Vinalhaven Island.

Facing southeast (for ease of description the facade will be referred to as the east elevation), the symmetrically composed two-bay front elevation contains a pair of replacement one-over-one double hung sash windows on the first and second stories, and a single two-over-two (presently boarded over) in the gable peak. Narrow corner boards rise to a simple raking cornice that is flush with the wall. The south side elevation features a shed porch at the southeast corner that is supported by a pair of posts linked by a balustrade. The porch shelters a door with six horizontal panels. There are three windows on the first and second stories, of which one of the latter is an emergency egress point for a steel fire escape. The north elevation has three windows and a door on the first story and three windows on the second story. A pair of windows are located on each story of the rear elevation, and a privy is attached to the northwest corner. There is a single brick flue that punctuates the roof ridge near the front gable end.

Inside, the first floor plan is comprised of a wide hallway that spans the building behind the front windows and contains a staircase to the second floor. The balance of the first floor contains a large dining room on the south side, and a kitchen, store room, and wood room (accessed from the hall) on the north side. The second floor contains the stairhall and one large open lodge room. Walls and ceilings throughout the building consist of narrow tongue and groove maple sheathing.

KNOX, MAINE

The Pleasant River Grange No. 492 is a modest wooden frame building that was originally constructed as a boarding house for workers in a nearby granite quarry. It was moved across the Pleasant River to its present site during the winter of 1908-09 and dedicated on December 31, 1909, although work continued on the building until 1912. The building is eligible for nomination to the National Register under Criterion A for its association with the Grange movement in late nineteenth and early twentieth century Maine, and Criterion C for its local architectural significance as an intact representative example of a grange hall.

Pleasant River Grange No. 492 was organized on October 23, 1908, at the residence of Watson H. Vinal. Sometime shortly thereafter, Capt. A.M. Webster closed his granite quarry on the opposite side of Pleasant River and donated the former boarding house to the newly formed grange. An historic photograph documents the subsequent move of the building across the ice to its present location during the winter of 1908-09. According to tradition, the work of repairing and remodeling the building lasted until 1912, during which time it was occasionally used for church services and dances that helped to raise money for the project. The original interior plan was substantially altered to accommodate the new use which provided a dining room, kitchen, two storerooms, and a staircase on the first floor, and the meeting hall on the second floor. The walls and ceilings were sheathed in narrow tongue and groove hard pine, and a new hardwood floor was installed in the meeting hall. Pleasant River Grange No. 492 still owns, maintains, and utilizes the building.

[The following overview history of the Grange movement was written by Elspeth Brown, and is repeated verbatim from a brochure announcing the photographic exhibit titled: "Ritual and Community: The Maine Grange."]

The Grange, or Patrons of Husbandry, is an agriculturally-based secret society founded in 1867. The Order, open to both men and women, was designed to meet the economic, social, and educational needs of a class of Americans - the small farmer - whose day to day lives were being irrevocably transformed in the post-Civil War period. The proliferation of the railroad, the mass production of farm machinery, and the increasing control of a new class of business men known as "speculators" or "middle-men" over the sale and distribution of farm products were a few of the many influences which led to widespread enthusiasm for the Grange in the 1870s. National membership in the Grange grew to over 1 million members in the wake of the 1873 depression, when farmers joined the organization as a means of buying and selling farm goods at wholesale prices. In the mid-1870s, membership plummeted as most Grange cooperative ventures failed to meet members' expectations.

By the 1880s, however, Grange membership in Maine was on the increase, part of what has been dubbed "the second Grange movement" centered in the Northeast; by 1887, Maine had the largest Grange membership in the nation. The focus of the second movement was an emphasis on the Grange's educational and social benefits.

The heart of the Grange lay, and continues to reside, in the local, or sub-ordinate, hall. In the nineteenth and early twentieth century, Grange members met each week to buy goods through the store, discuss current events, enjoy a debate on the question, "the man with the hoe or the woman with the hoe - which?," rehearse a play, tableaux, or reading, initiate new candidates, or hear a presentation on a new agricultural technique. Today, the Grange programs continue to feature social and educational events, including musical recitals, readings, public suppers and games, and cooking, needlework and art contests.
