The bridge spans Mosby Creek slightly upstream from the latter's junction with the Row River. The creek and bridge are named for the Mosby family, whose progenitor, David Mosby, settled a Donation Land Claim in the area in 1853. This is the oldest covered span remaining in Lane County, wherein the greatest number of covered bridges were erected. There are 21 such structures standing in Lane County today. Considered in poor condition, Mosby Creek bridge serves mostly local traffic. Some pier timbers were replaced in 1975. Housing needs repair to siding and paint. Rot in stringers. Rated





The Mosby Creek Bridge is Lane County's oldest bridge, built in 1920, at a cost of \$4,125. It is one of the few Lane County bridges supported by wooden pilings instead of concrete abutments.

Spliced chords and steel rod cross braces on the upper chords of the bridge are modifications of the basic Howe truss design. Instead of cedar shingles, the housed span utilizes a corrugated metal roof.

As with most of the covered bridges in the Cottage Grove area, vandals have left their mark on the bridge with cans of spray paint.

The Mosby Creek Bridge is one of three bridges which can be seen from the Oregon, Pacific and Eastern steam excursion train.

The stream was named for David Mosby, a pioneer of 1853 who staked claim to 1,600 acres of land east of the present city of Cottage Grove.

TO GET THERE:

Leaving Interstate 5 at Cottage Grove, travel southeast on Row River Road approximately 2 miles to the Row River Connection Road.

Turn left, cross the railroad, and follow Mosby Creek Road southeast 2 miles to Lang Road. Mosby Creek Bridge is located on Lang Road two-tenths of a mile from the junction.

rnysical description of property and Statement or nistorical significance:

The Mosby Covered Bridge is the oldest remaining in Lane County. Erected in 1920 this bridge has a span of ninety feet and crosses Mosby Creek upstream from its junction with the Row River. The bridge has a vertical board and batten exterior and a gable roof. Openings at the eaves on the east and west elevations provide lighting. The bridge is set on wooden piers. Its truss construction is as follows:

This bridge is named for the Mosby family. David Mosby took a Donation Land Claim in this area. Born in 1822 in Mercer County, Kentucky, Mosby arrived in Oregon in 1850. He stated that he settled his claim on November 16, 1853. His descendants yet occupy the Mosby lands. (see file sheet for Mosby house).
